Grain men said there was little hedging pressure in wheat, indicating that most of the newly harvested grain was not being offered for sale.

Wheat closed 3 to 4 cents higher, July \$1.95 3/4-1.96, corn 1 1/2-1 3/4 higher, July \$1.55 1/4-1 1/2, oats 1/2-3/4 higher, July 74 3/4-75 1/2, rye 2 1/2-2 3/4 higher, July \$1.35 3/4-1.36 1/2, soybeans 1 1/4 to 2 cents higher, July \$2.72 1/4-1/2, and lard unchanged to 7 cents a hundred pounds higher, July \$9.87.

Salable receipts were estimated at 9,000 hogs, 7,500 cattle, 400 calves and 1,000 sheep.

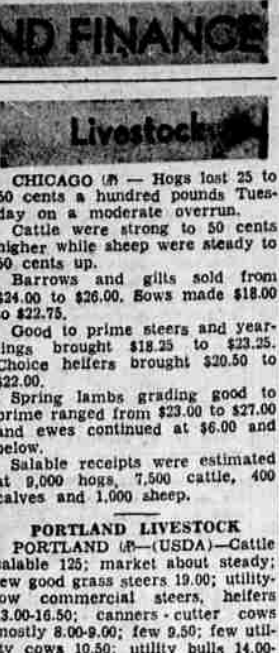

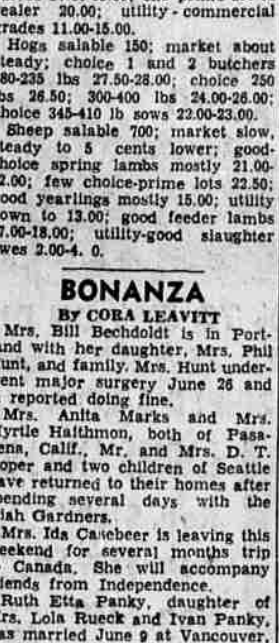

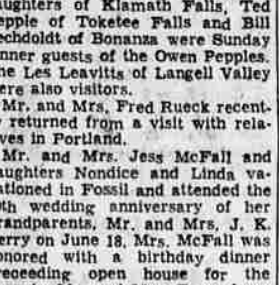

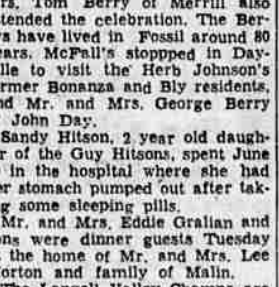

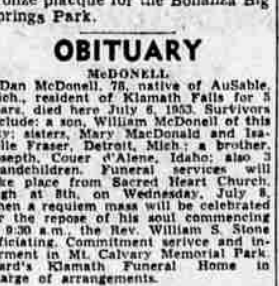
STRONG AS A HOUSE — Five cars and tractor are hoisted to roof of home in test at Williamstown, Mass. The house can be transported by trailer to a site.
