Struck Eugene Plants Reopen

EUGENE (P)—The three-day strike of butchers against two meat packing plants here ended Thursday with union acceptance of an employer offer on wages and other contract benefits.

Bob Simmons, union business agent, said the workers voted Wednesday night to accept pay increases ranging from 5 to 16 cents an hour effective Thursday. He said the agreement also calls for a health and welfare program effective May 1, 1954. The pre-strike pay scale ranged from \$1.20 to \$2.12 an hour.

The struck plants were Irish-McBroom and Mayberry and Chapman. About 30 workers were laid. Some 20 others were allowed to cross picket lines to assure proper care of meat in storage.

OLYMPIA (P)—Approximately 200 nudist-delegates from sunbathing clubs throughout the Northwest held their annual convention in the Bald Hills area 25 miles southeast of here.
