Man Falls To Death In Park

The first fatal accident at Crater Lake National Park in nearly three years occurred about 5 p.m. yesterday when Ed Clark, about 40, fell to his death, according to information telephoned this morning by John B. Wosky, superintendent of the park.

Clark, with a woman friend from Cave Junction, was taking pictures in the park. He left her and the car and was descending into the Castle Creek Canyon with his camera when he lost his footing. At that spot there is a vertical drop of about 200 feet.

National park rangers recovered the body about 8:30 p.m. and it was taken to Grants Pass by Hull & Hull, Grants Pass morticians.

Clark and his sister, Eunice Sundry, have operated the Illinois Valley Grocery Market at Cave Junction for several years. She was notified by park officials immediately following the accident. Funeral arrangements are not known.

Festival Stages 'Violent' Plays

ASHLAND—Action, often of a violent nature, is the theme of the Shakespearean festival at Ashland this season. Most violent of the four plays to be presented this August is "Henry Sixth, Part 1," which one member of the company has described as "an extended Elizabethan brawl."

For this one, James Sandoe, festival director from Colorado universally, has filled the stage with scolding ladders, broadswords, daggers, and every instrument of ancient warfare known.

Carrying much of the action in the fight scenes are two groups especially trained for the task. One group, students of modern dance, play the "fiends" who help Joan of Arc make life miserable for the English soldiers. (Joan was no saint to Britishers of Shakespeare's day.)

The other group of six actors are being trained to fight as a team throughout the play. They are taught the use of various kinds of swords, eye-gouging and public abuse for hand-to-hand combats in the play.

"Coriolanus," the Roman tragedy, features mob violence. Allen Fletcher, from Carnegie Tech, Pittsburgh, is qualified to direct, having handled the mobs in "Julius Caesar" last year.

The comedy, "Taming of the Shrew," is filled with buffets, kicks, china-smashing and the like, but all in fun. The other comedy, "Merchant of Venice," is relatively free of violence.

Reserved tickets are \$1.80 for a single admission and may be acquired by writing Oregon Shakespearean Festival Association, Ashland.

Roy C. Watson Rites Held

Roy C. Watson, 62, identified with the lumber industry here since 1935, died following a brief illness on July 9.

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MRS. MARTHA HOTCHKISS

Mrs. Hotchkiss, Davis Creek, Dies

LAKEVIEW, Ore. — Mrs. Martha Adaline Hotchkiss, resident of Goose Lake Valley since 1873, died in Lakeview Thursday, at 88. She was 10 years of age when her parents moved the family from Missouri to Davis Creek, Calif., at the south end of Goose Lake.

Funeral services for this pioneer mother were held at 2 p.m. Saturday from the chapel of the Ousley-Osterman Mortuary with the Rev. Gordon C. Griffin officiating. Interment was in the family plot at the Odd Fellows Cemetery.

Mrs. Hotchkiss was born Martha Adaline Sullivan at Concordia, Mo. In 1875, the family came west by train to Reno then by wagon to Davis Creek.

The pioneer girl married Jason Hotchkiss and settled at Valley Falls. They were the parents of four children: They were Andrew, who died in 1922, Plumas W. Hotchkiss, Lakeview, Mrs. Mabel Ross, Lakeview, with whom Mrs. Hotchkiss was making her home at time of death.

In addition to her three children, Mrs. Hotchkiss is survived by five grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren. Her husband died in 1937.

Airline Crews Change Bases

Addition of Klamath Falls to West Coast Airlines' route necessitated a change in crew bases. Portland has been designated as a permanent base for origination of three daily round trips to Klamath Falls and two daily round trips to Boise. WCA is transferring eight flight crews and their families to Portland for that purpose.

Regulations governing maximum daily pilot time made it impossible to fly the route with Seattle and Boise-based crews.

WCA announced it will be hiring seven flight stewards to be based in Portland. Interviews will be July 14 in the WCA ticket office, 4th and Oak, Portland, for young men 21-28 who are high school graduates.

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
