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2 Bug Pests Noted In Area

Presence of lygus bugs and clover seed weevil is being noted in the Basin area, according to J. D. Vertrees of the county agent's office, and now is the time to take measures for prevention.

Unless prompt action is taken, says Vertrees, congregations of lygus bugs in clover and alfalfa will rapidly pyramid to the point where control cannot be attained.

The clover seed weevil is now on the increase. It lays eggs in the seed pod, the worm hatches and eats away the seed, destroying the crop.

The same control for both may be used satisfactorily with DDT or a combination of that and sulphur.

At least one and a half to two pounds of actual DDT per acre should be applied. This works out at 20 pounds of 10 per cent or 35 pounds of 5 per cent DDT per acre.

DDT dust containing 50 to 85 per cent sulphur will also aid in holding down clover midew, attacks of which are beginning to show up around the county.

It is recommended that dusting be done early in the morning before the bees are active.

Further consideration of proposed truck routes through Klamath Falls as well as other highway and traffic problems will be given on Aug. 11 when the state highway commission plans a visit to the area.

Sam Baldock, Oregon State Highway Engineer, has advised Mayor Paul Landry that his group is currently planning to arrive here on that morning and will be here for a noon luncheon.

Further details of the visit will be published as soon as the agenda is completed.

In Presidio, Even The Poor Folks Have Air-Conditioning

PRESIDIO, Tex. (AP)—Folks in this little U. S.-Mexico border town say they don't begin to feel the heat until the thermometer hits 100.

It hits 100 often enough so that even the poor folks' adobe homes here have air conditioners—and often enough so that Presidio has a national reputation as a hot spot.

For 56 days this summer—from May 19 until yesterday—the temperature reached 100 or higher, often 110, and on one searing day in June it reached 117.

What stopped it yesterday was rain, 83 of an inch of precious rain which slanted down onto the mountains and into this valley to drain into the dry Rio Grande. All of Presidio's 1,500 or so souls were jubilant.

Habitually the state's hottest city, Presidio yesterday got Texas' heaviest rain. And the temperature rose no higher than 87.

Ask Postmaster Mills Aubrey how long it had been 100 or higher here and he says:

"How long is time? It's always that hot here in the summer, at steel rolling pins."
