Amusement Ride For The Birds And Kiddies Too

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP)—Kiddies in Land Park's kiddieland fly with the birds when they ride the little airplanes.

A mother robin has a nest in the framework of the structure from which the planes are suspended—right against the center pole.

Mrs. Robin drops down to feed her birds and then flies away as the planes, and nest, begin to spin. Sometimes Ray Silva delays the start of a kiddie flight to permit the bird to finish depositing the food. When she returns with another load and finds everything whirling she waits on a nearby fence.

'Mystery House' Owner Loses Suit

LOS ANGELES (AP)—John Lister, operator of the 'Mystery House' near Gold Hill, Ore., lost a damage and injunction suit in superior court Tuesday.

The suit was filed against the owners of 'Confusion Hill' near Garberville, Calif., a similar tourist attraction.

The judge ruled that Lister's attraction was a "natural accident" caused when an old mining shack slid down a hill out of plumb. This created the illusion that objects fell up rather than down. The judge said the house was not subject to copyright.

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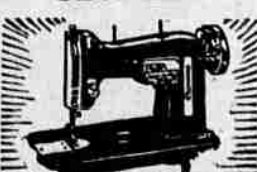
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
