Divorce Given Even Though Ground Unsure

Peculiarities of the Spanish language caused some confusion in Circuit Court Wednesday afternoon when Mrs. Edwards Jasso, mother of 11 children, was granted a default divorce decree.

Mrs. Jasso's chief complaint against her section hand husband, Joe Ynes Jasso, was that he called her vile names.

"Tell the court what he called you," advised Attorney J. C. O'Neill, counsel for the plaintiff.

Mrs. Jasso let loose with a long string of Spanish words presumed to be invectives.

"The court doesn't understand Spanish," Attorney O'Neill told his client. "Now repeat those words in English."

A puzzled look crossed Mrs. Jasso's face. She explained the words didn't mean anything in English.

"But they are vile words?" asked Judge David R. Vandenberg.

"Oh yes, very bad," Mrs. Jasso replied. "Very terrible. I am ashamed. I hide my face. It is awful."

Judge Vandenberg conceded the words must have been bad and granted the decree. He also awarded Mrs. Jasso \$120 a month for the support of her children ranging in age from 4 months to 17 years.

Velde Favors Matthews Being Quizzed On Clergy

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Velde (R-Ill.) told newsmen today he believes J. B. Matthews should be given an opportunity to tell the House Un-American Activities Committee what he knows about Communist infiltration of the clergy.

But Velde added that a decision on Matthews' request to testify will be left to the committee at a closed meeting Monday.

Velde, chairman of the committee, said, however, that he is "not going to allow it to get into a Protestant-Catholic or religious fight."

Matthews, who resigned under fire last week as executive, staff director of the Senate investigating subcommittee headed by Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.), said in his letter to the House group yesterday that his request was suggested by "hundreds of citizens from all parts of the United States."

He said these citizens want him to "present exhaustive documentation on the Communist infiltration of the clergy."

"I will welcome such an opportunity if my appearance is agreeable to your members," Matthews added.

Velde said he had read Matthews' magazine article which touched off a storm of criticism and led to the resignation of all three Democratic members from McCarthy's investigations subcommittee. Velde declined comment on the article.

Matthews, in his letter to Velde, said the article "is completely factual and fully documented."

"As you know," he said, "it would require more than a little time to present the evidence adequately."
