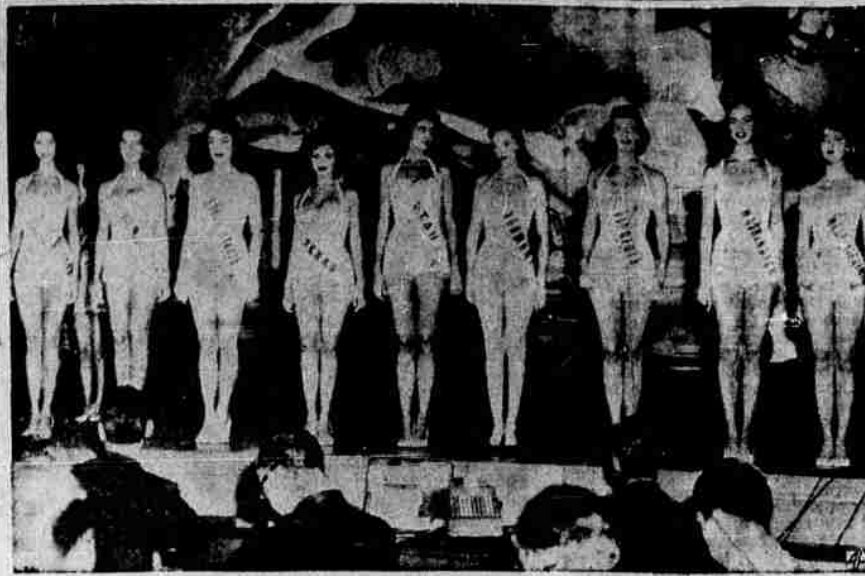

## Winning an Oscar Helps Income:

**HOLLYWOOD** (AP)—Recently a columnist ran an item: "Advice to actors: work hard, give a great performance, win an Oscar, don't work like Katina Paxinou, James Dunn, Lulise Rainer, Paul Muni, Mercedes McCambridge, Celeste Holm."

This brought up the old Hollywood question: Is there such a thing as an Oscar curse? I asked Miss McCambridge, who made a sensational, award-winning debut in films as the backstage politico in "All the King's Men" and has done little in the movies since.

"Of course there's no Oscar curse," she replied flatly. "Winning an Oscar is certainly no drawback; it is bound to do a person some good. I am very grateful to the award. Before I won it, my salary was \$750 a week. Now it is considerably more than that."

"It is true that those actors who were named in the item have not done much in pictures lately. But don't forget this: all of them, myself included, are pretty difficult to cast. The exception is Jimmy Dunn, who is a great personality, although the producers don't seem to realize it."

"I'm sure the Oscar has done plenty of good for someone like Gary Cooper. It would also be great for the career of a Marilyn Monroe."

Miss McCambridge subscribed to the theory that there are actors and personalities in the movies. The actors often win Academy Awards; the personalities win the box office honors. And it's the personalities who are most in demand by the producers.

Part of Miss McCambridge's absence from the screen has been a matter of circumstance. She did a few pictures after her Oscar, then had an unsuccessful pregnancy. Last year she accompanied her husband, Director Fletcher Markle, to New York, where he directed TV's Studio One for a season.

Now "he's still trying to recover from the TV grind" and the couple is back in Hollywood. Recently Mercedes astounded her agents by turning down a film role. "But nobody turns down pictures these days," they protested.

"Well, I am," she replied. "The script's okay, but I don't like my part. I'm tired of playing men—or parts that men should be playing. I don't want to play the person
