Fremont Forest Spraying Delayed

LAKEVIEW—A sagebrush spraying project, originally set to begin July 18, was postponed a week because the contractor was delayed on a budworm spraying job at La Grande. It was announced by J. Clifford Winger, range management officer on the Fremont National Forest.

The project is the spraying by airplane, of about 3000 acres of sagebrush in the Barley Camp area of the Fremont, in South Warner, and adjoining lands to the south on the Modoc National Forest. Purpose of the spraying is an experiment to kill the sage with a 2-4-D herbicide, thus removing the sage as competition to the range grasses.

Where native grasses are not sufficiently abundant to furnish seed after the sage is killed, it is planned to seed with intermediate wheatgrass next fall. From 500 to 800 acres will be seeded with the wheatgrass.

The spraying now slated to start July 18, is expected to take about three weeks. The project is being jointly conducted by the Fremont and the Modoc National Forests, and the spraying service of the Ace Flying Service of Salem. The flights will be based at the Lakeview Municipal Airport.

Lake Co. Group Adds Service

LAKEVIEW—Proposing to bolster the demand for "these Lake County Feeders," the Lake County Stockgrowers Association has started a marketing service for its members, operated through the office of County Agent Elgin Corneil.

The association's marketing committee, headed by Louis Winger, has set up a listing service for the stockmen by which the numbers of cattle which the members will have for sale next fall are offered to potential buyers.

The present list includes 5058 cattle from 39 members of the association. The list will be mailed and buyer contacts will be made directly with the members. To keep the list current, members are urged to notify Corneil's office when stock is sold or added to the list.

The marketing service is one phase of the educational campaign being run out by the association to spread the fame of the Lake County feeders. Another phase, aimed at improvement of the range herds, is the range bull sale which the association will hold here October 16 and 17. The sale, headed by Don Hotchkiss, is intended to increase the use of top quality bulls on the ranges here.

Henry Wins Radio Contest

Taft Quits For Session

NEW YORK (AP)—Sen. Taft (R-Ohio) withdrew Friday from further participation in the current session of Congress because of a hip ailment.

The Ohio Republican relinquished active floor leadership of GOP senators to Sen. Knowland, of California, last June 10, although he kept the title of majority leader.

Friday, New York Hospital, where Taft is convalescing after the latest of a series of treatments for the hip, issued a bulletin which said in part:

"Sen. Taft does not intend to return to his duties at this session of Congress, which apparently will end in August."

Known to many as "Mr. Republican," the 63-year-old son of the late President and U. S. Supreme Court chief justice is serving his third term in the Senate. He first was elected in 1936 and was re-elected in 1950 for a 6-year term.

Lake Co. Library Adds Collection

LAKEVIEW—A special collection of books for boys and girls will soon appear at the Lake County Library, provided by the Madeline Manning Memorial Fund, it was announced this week by Lee Hansen, Lake County 4-H Club agent.

The fund was started by the Oregon 4-H boys and girls at the recent summer school at Oregon State College to honor the memory of Madeline Manning, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Manning, Westside. Miss Manning died suddenly at Corvallis while attending the summer school.

In their meetings following Miss Manning's death, the 4-H members held votes in their several residential organizations at OSC and agreed to establish the fund. They suggested the memorial be in the form of a bookshelf. Collections taken there were brought to Lakeview by Esther Thackerud, a state 4-H Club agent, in the form of a check for \$88.36.

Since that time, additional donations have increased the total to more than \$100, and Hansen said that the fund will remain open for future contributions.
