Allies Will Fight On If Reds Reject Peace, Dulles Says

WASHINGTON (AP)—Grin United States concern over Communist conduct in the truce negotiations was mirrored today in official word as the Allies met to discuss in Korea if the Reds reject an "honorable peace."

Dulles denounced as absurd Red insistence on "guarantees" by the United Nations Command that Syngman Rhee's South Korean government would abide by the armistice terms.

Dulles in effect questioned the Reds' good faith. "The proposed armistice does not guarantee the future conduct of any government. I wish that someone would guarantee the future good conduct of the Communist regime of China."

Dulles spoke over nationwide radio and television networks and what he said was also broadcast throughout the world by the Voice of America.

He said Rhee had been afraid that the Reds might use a political conciergerie, which would follow an armistice, as a cover to infiltrate South Korea and bombard it with hostile propaganda.

CHICAGO (AP)—Hog prices reached their highest levels in four years this week, but there was an undercurrent of weakness.

Light receipts spurred advances on barrows and gilts of 25-30 cents. Buyer resistance to increasing prices brought a downturn Friday.

The week's top price was \$27.70, highest since September, 1948. Receipts of 35,100 compared with 34,200 a week ago and 46,400 in the same week a year ago.

NEW YORK (AP)—The American Inventor, first American food relief ship for Eastern Germany, sailed yesterday with 1,600 tons of flour, dried milk and lard.

New Russian Trade Pacts With Europe States Reported

LONDON (AP)—The Soviet Union—with new trade pacts signed with France, Denmark and other Western European nations—appeared today to have launched in earnest her long expected trade offensive.

The trade maneuvers—part of the entire peace offensive—are believed aimed at relieving the economic ills of the restive satellite nations now suffering over lack of consumer goods.

Copenhagen announced Denmark would build five more cold storage frigates for the Soviet Union within the next two years.

Moscow dispatches said this week Western fur buyers are in Moscow and said bidding for furs to break.

Japan-Tokyo is moving swiftly into sizable barter deals with the Soviet Union and Communist China, in an effort to bolster the nation's economy and offset the possible economic shock of a Korean armistice.

India—The government is dickering for a barter agreement with the Soviet Union under which India will buy one million tons of wheat annually over the next five years.

Argentina—The Buenos Aires government announced recently it will get 500,000 tons of petroleum and 300,000 tons of coal from Russia under a new trade treaty.

Iran—Iran has signed a new commercial pact with Russia calling for exchange of Iranian caviar, fish products, tobacco, rice and cotton in return for sugar, cloth and other Soviet manufactured goods.

The Netherlands—A Dutch spokesman announced this week Dutch-Soviet trade talks are taking place in Moscow.

WEST GLACIER, Mont. (AP)—Secretary of Interior Douglas McKay Saturday called for the federal government's support of national parks.

McKay said national parks are "an economic, social and spiritual asset of the nation. Their support as a responsibility of the federal government... is abundantly justified."

McKay's speech was prepared for a dedication ceremony for a 10,000-acre addition to Glacier National Park, located in northwestern Montana.

The addition was acquired from the state of Montana in an exchange for about 300,000 acres of federal land in eastern Montana.
