LONG BEACH, Calif. (AP) — The new Miss Universe is a little angel face from France, 18-year-old Christiane Martel.

The brunette charmer from Paris defeated a gorgeous galaxy of contestants from virtually every corner of the globe to win the silver and gold crown last night.

Miss Martel, who openly aspires to a screen career and has had bit parts in three French films, edged out blonde Miss United States, Myrna Hansen of Chicago, and Japan's diminutive Kinuko Ito. They finished second and third, just ahead of Mexico's vivacious Ana Lepe Jimenez and Australia's Maxine Morgan.

The French lass became the second 18-year-old to win the Miss Universe crown. The first winner, in last year's inaugural contest, was Armi Kusela of Finland.

"Mais oui!" were the lovely winner's words on winning the award. It's the French equivalent of "Oh, no!" although a literal translation is "But yes."

She posed for photographers for an hour in her brilliant crown, scepter high and smile bright, but finally she had to sit down.

"My feet are killing me," she pouted prettily in French.

Miss Martel had been a favorite of her sister contestants and her victory was well received by a capacity crowd of 3,800 attending the final event of the 4-day pageant.
