

Yankees Win Two From Chicago White Sox

Ed Lopat and Vic Raschi, a couple of seasoned veterans who count World Series pay as regular income, have straightened out the New York Yankees.

For the first time in weeks, there is no frantic patter of pursuit. Chicago, whipped twice yesterday, in six games back, Cleveland's disastrous collapse has dumped the Indians into fourth place, 11 games behind, Boston, working on a six-game winning streak, is third but still a distance 10½ games to the rear.

There is no change in the National League pattern after three split double-headers with Brooklyn still holding a three-game lead over Milwaukee. Philadelphia remains third, six games behind the Dodgers and the New York Giants, who took over fourth place Saturday, hold a one percentage point edge on St. Louis.

BIG NEWS

Big news of the day in the National was that somebody finally scored a run on Allan Worthington, the Giants rookie hotshot. Milwaukee broke the right-hander's scoreless string after 10 2-3 innings and

beat him 2-1 in the second game of a double-header, called after five innings because of darkness. New York had won the first game 7-5 on Hank Thompson's two-run homer in the ninth.

The story in the American League was the twin job the Yankees did on the White Sox 6-3 and 3-0 before 54,215, an all-time Gomiskey Park record crowd. Lopat copped the first to boost his season record to 10-1 on an eight-hitter. Mickey Mantle's second double keyed a four-run rally in the ninth. Raschi held the Sox to two hits, ending Sam Mele's 22-game hitting streak.

The upstart Boston Red Sox rolled over Cleveland 3-0 and 7-5. Maury McDermott gave the Tribe only one hit in eight innings of the first game. Al Smith's single, when he threw two balls to the first hitter in the ninth, Manager Lou Boudreau called for Ellis Kinder to finish the job in 1-2-3 order.

George Kell's three-run homer in the eighth wrapped up the second game. Ralph Branca, whose famous Brooklyn home run ball never will

be forgotten, won his first American League game for Detroit 13-3 over Philadelphia. The Tigers and A's settled for an 8-8 tie in the second, called after 11 innings because of darkness. Ray Boone hit two big homers—a grand slam in the opener and a three-run clout with two out in the ninth to tie up the second.

WIN SECOND

Washington turned five walks and seven hits into 11 runs in the third and fourth innings to grab the second game from St. Louis 13-4 after dropping the first 5-4. Roy Sievers and Les Moss hit homers for the Browns' victory. Keith Thomas and Clyde Vollmer for the Nats.

Brooklyn had to come from behind with five runs in the eighth and then stayed off a Cincinnati rally to get an even break with the troublesome Reds. Cincy won the first game 4-1 with Ted Kluszewski's 27th and 28th homers for a new Cincinnati team home run high of 112. Fred Baczewski, ex-Chicago Cub, tamed the Dodgers with five hits.

The Dodgers were helped by two costly throwing errors by Roy McMillan and Bobby Adams as they scored five in the eighth inning to take the second game 7-5. Carl

Benny Morrison, winner of the fourth heat, final and pot race last night at Gems Speedway, made a big bid for the main event win but was smacked out of contention on the seventeenth of the 25-lap feature.

Morrison, who drives his big Hudson like he means it, drew mixed cheers and catcalls when the wrecker hauled his car away after battling winner Russ Newell for 16 laps.

Last night's program was one of the best of the season and Track Manager Sam Neelin announced last night he would run Wednesday night this week.

The show-stealer last night was the final heat that saw three cars turn over during the hectic race.

Morrison's car was one of the casualties that got mixed in a four-car scramble on the final turn of the fourth lap. Morrison, upended along with Neil Mayfield — Clint Loeber and George Smith were also involved in the scramble — went on to win the race over Matt Curstian and Lyle Hopkins of Yreka.

Morrison came back to win the special event, the pot race, ahead of S. R. Crawley and Hankins.

Jim Hargrove in K-7600 furnished the fun in the 'B' Main Event. He turned his car over twice, on the first lap and tenth, and finished out of the money.

Crawley, making a strong bid for the blue ribbon, spun out on the thirteenth lap and never got back in contention. Yreka's Hopkins, rid of pesky Crawley, went on to win handily over Smith and Ed Rouin.

Hopkins is also the lad who left town with the trophy in the dash event and a kiss from the trophy girl.

He won the second heat, Jack Mauney the first, Neil Mayfield the third and Morrison the fourth. This was Hopkins' first appearance on the Klamath Falls track and he filled in adequately for Woody Thomason and Chick Robinson, Yreka drivers absent last night.

TANGLE — Hopkins won the trophy dash when Morrison and Mauney, second place winner, tangled on the final turn of the third lap.

To make the show even more pro-Morrison, Ben's brother, Bob, captured the Pittman race in the same K-8 Hudson.

Smith moved into second spot in the main event and stayed there after Morrison met with mishap on the seventeenth, perked out by one car and clouted hard by another as he spun around.

Wednesday night's show has the same starting time — 6:45 time trials, 7:30 first race.

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Spokane Holds To Half Game Lead In WIL

The Spokane Indians and Salem Senators went their separate ways in the Western International Baseball League Monday after a "crucial" weekend meeting that settled nothing.

The two clubs, only half a game apart when they opened the four-game stand at Salem last Friday, divided a doubleheader Sunday. That gave them an even split in the series and left them where they were at the start, still half a game apart with Spokane out in front.

The road ahead may be easier for the Indians. They play three games starting Monday night with last place Victoria. Salem, idle Monday night, goes up against the Lewiston Broncos Tuesday. And the Broncos are still smarting for their last meeting early in June. They were leading the league at the time and appeared a shoo-in for the first half championship. However, Salem took the series and went on to win the title and a berth in the postseason playoff.

TEAM UP — Bill Franks and John Cordell teamed to produce a five-hitter as the Indians turned back the Senators 4-2 in Sunday's seven-inning opener. Salem came back to take the nightcap 3-1.

In other games Calgary clubbed Yakima twice, 6-1 and 3-1; Wenatchee downed Vancouver 4-3 and 5-2; Tri-City edged Victoria 8-6 in 10 innings, and Lewiston and Edmonton split a pair, the Braves taking the first game 4-1 and the Stampede the nightcap 7-0.

Calgary's Bill Stites turned in one of the season's best pitching jobs at Yakima. Andy Anderson singled into left field in the third inning and after that the Bears went hitless and scoreless. Stites fanned five and walked three.

Rookie southpaw Rick Botelho notched a four-hitter for Wenatchee. The 18-year-old struck out 13 Vancouver batters, and helped his own cause by hanging out a triple and driving in a run.

HOME RUN — Len Tran's two-run homer in the bottom of the tenth saved the day for Tri-City. It came after Tri-City had whittled away at Victoria's early 6-1 lead to tie the game in the eighth.

It was the second overtime game in two days for Victoria and Tri-City. The Braves went 11 innings before downing the Tyees 3-2 in the first game of a Saturday doubleheader. Victoria won the second game 7-3.

In other Saturday games, Spokane beat Salem 6-3; Calgary edged Yakima 4-3; Lewiston drubbed Edmonton 12-5 and Vancouver downed Wenatchee 12-3.

Fire Destroys Race Horses

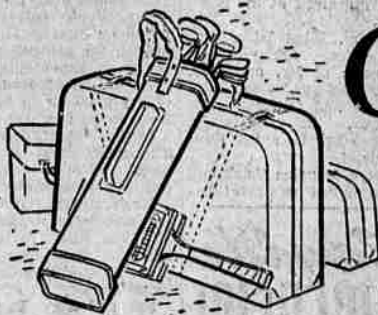
