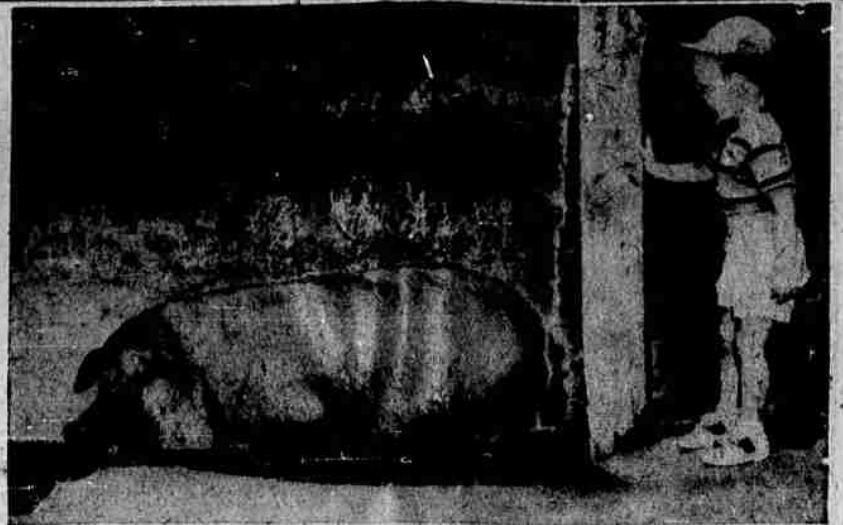

## Campus Tract Under Lease

SEATTLE (AP)—The University of Washington's board of regents signed a 35-year lease with a Detroit group Saturday giving the university a minimum of 27 billion dollars for management and development of its Metropolitan Tract in downtown Seattle.

The lease with University Properties, Inc., headed by Roger L. Stevens of Detroit, takes effect Nov. 1, 1954, when the present 50-year lease expires.

Stevens headed a syndicate which two years ago bought New York City's Empire State Building. He now has a project for a 75 million dollar business center in Boston.

The lease guarantees the University an average annual rental of \$1,700,000 during for the first four years, during which modernization programs will be carried out. From then on it becomes a percentage lease, with a one-million-dollar minimum the rest of the term.

Not included in the deal is the Olympic Hotel, which has been sub-leased for 22 years to William Edris, its present operator.

In 1961, when the 10-acre tract was considered worth only about \$15 it was donated by pioneer settlers as the original university campus.

## Hollywood Stars, Nixon Visit Scouts At Jamboree

JAMBOREE CITY, Calif. (AP)—Hollywood stars came to Jamboree City Monday to entertain 45,000 Boy Scouts and their leaders who spent a full day Sunday which included a speech by Vice President Richard Nixon and a huge religious convocation.

Sunday this 3,000 acre ranch bulged with an estimated 98,000 visitors, here to view the colorful site of the third national Scout Jamboree. Many of the guests were relatives of scouts.

Monday's program included an afternoon "Jamboree Variety Review" with Dorothy Lamour, Dick Powell, June Allyson, Jerry Colonna, the Bell Sisters and other entertainers. In another afternoon show the scheduled entertainers included Spade Cooley, Roscoe Ates, magicians, a quartet dance champions and animal acts. The program also included a big Navy and Marine air show.

Before the Sunday night convocation, Nixon spoke to the scouts, leaders and visitors seated on the ground in the hillside arena. He left for Washington after the ceremony. He had flown west especially for the Jamboree.

"You have been taught and have learned yourselves what it is to be free-free to speak your own minds, to live your own lives and to worship God in your own way," said the vice president.

"You have not been instilled with the shameful arrogance of the dictatorial mind, the intense hatred and bigotry of those of your contemporaries behind the Iron Curtain who since boyhood have been taught to hate and to fear and to be contemptuous."

Representatives from 16 other countries are sitting with you right now," said Nixon. "Let us work toward the day when Boy Scout leaders from all the nations of the world may be able to gather together with you at just such an annual jamboree. The cause of brotherhood and peace on this earth could receive no greater testimonial."

"You don't have to be concerned about the free enterprise system," the vice president said. "All you have to do is enter one of the swap tents at this Jamboree. Before I got out a fellow from Texas had traded me out of my fountain pen. I got a dried rattlesnake skin."
