

Major Truce Terms Listed

PANMUNJOM (AP)—Here are major terms of the Korean truce draft, expected to be signed soon now that the Reds have given the go-ahead to proceed with final details:

Fighting stops 12 hours after the truce signing; troops withdraw from buffer zone about 2 1/2 miles wide across Korea; troops and arms frozen at truce level but rotation of 33,000 men monthly permitted; Allies withdraw within five days from North Korean coastal islands.

Military Armistice Commission of five senior officers from each side supervises armistice terms; Neutral Nation Supervisory Commission (Sweden, Switzerland, Poland, Czechoslovakia) observes truce terms.

Prisoners of war who want to go home exchanged at Panmunjom within two months; balking POWs turned over to five-nation Repatriation Commission (India, Sweden, Switzerland, Czechoslovakia, Poland); India supplies guards for POWs; Red agents (seven per 1,000 POWs) make "explanations" during 90-day period—in presence of neutrals—to encourage repatriation; POWs who change minds repatriated on commission majority vote.

Recommendations made for a political conference to begin within 90 days after an armistice to discuss peaceful settlement of entire Korean question; problem of POWs persisting in refusal to go home handed to conference for 30 days; after the 30 days, those still refusing repatriation released to civilian status in South Korea with right to go to neutral nations of their choice.

The Communists reserved the right yesterday to place before the political conference the problem of 27,000 anti-Red North Korean POWs released in South Korea on orders of President Syngman Rhee.

Terms Would Force ROK To Fight Alone

PANMUNJOM (AP)—A partial record of the secret Korean armistice negotiations shows that the Republic of Korea Army would have to fight all alone if it violates the truce which apparently is imminent.

The Communist delegation, breaking temporarily the news blackout on the talks, cited yesterday 10 Allied pledges made to the Reds that the armistice agreement will be kept.

Quotes listed by the Reds were confirmed by Lt. Col. Milton Herr, U.N. Command spokesman, as coming from the official record. Here, in brief, are the "assurances" listed by the U.N. Command of units of the U.N. Command:

1. Receipt by the U.N. Command of "necessary assurances" from the South Korean government "that it will not obstruct in any manner the implementation of terms of the draft armistice agreement."

2. That ROK forces will withdraw "from the buffer zone after the armistice signing."

3. That the U.N. Command will not support "any aggressive action of units of the Republic of Korea in violation of an armistice."

4. That the U.N. Command will observe the truce if the ROKs begin aggressive action and the Communists take action to resist.

5. That the U.N. Command will not give any support to South Korea, including equipment and supplies, if the ROKs took aggressive action and the Communists take action to resist.

6. That there "is no time limit to the armistice." (The Communists had noted in the secret sessions that President Syngman Rhee was quoted as saying he would observe a truce for only 90 days after a political conference meets to discuss Korean settlement.)

7. That the U.N. Command will protect all personnel of North Korean, Chinese and neutral nations who enter South Korea to supervise armistice terms.

8. That the U.N. Command will "to the limits of its ability" see that armistice terms are observed. (On this point, the Reds quoted a letter from Gen. Mark W. Clark, U.N. Commanders June 29.)

9. That the U.N. Command "bears unrelenting responsibility" to recover the 27,000 North Korean war prisoners released by the South Korean government; the Reds noted that Clark said June 29 that his command "is continuing" efforts to recapture the prisoners but that the Allied truce delegation declined to report further on the matter.

10. That the Allies would turn over to the five-nation repatriation commission the remaining anti-Communist war prisoners.

The Communists declared they were quoting from the official record so "that the people of the world may know the assurances."

Chinese Red's Action Implies He's In For Good

SEOUL (AP)—Front-line infantrymen reported a lone Chinese soldier ran out in front of the main Allied line on the Western Korean Front last night and yelled "Syngman Rhee and Chad-un-ni same."

Chad-un-ni may have been a Korean or Chinese dialect translation of Chiang Kai-shek.

Then the Chinese shouted: "You no blank good! You are short timers and stay in your trenches or you will be killed."

Woodmen Erect Taft Statue

WASHINGTON (AP)—An unveiling was arranged today for a bronze memorial plaque in honor of William Howard Taft.

The plaque, erected at the former home of the onetime President and chief justice of the United States, is a gift to the District of Columbia from the Woodmen of the World life insurance society, currently in convention here.

ARRIVE TO ADVISE
SAIGON, Indochina (AP)—Sixty U. S. Air Force officers arrived here Friday to train and advise French airmen fighting the Communist-led Vietnam.

Unemployment At Low Point

WASHINGTON (AP)—Unemployment in the United States last year averaged only 1,700,000, the Census Bureau reported yesterday, to reach the lowest point since World War II.

It said also that the number of working wives, about 10,400,000 in April of last year, topped the peak World War II year by about two million although it was unchanged from 1951.

Dyer of Hair Admits Checks

BOSTON (AP)—Police today were holding a man they said admitted dyeing his hair three different colors to fool some store owners that many times with bogus checks.

Police Capt. George O'Donnell said James Cunningham, 26, had stored three bottles of hair dye—red, brown and black—in a subway station locker as part of his check-passing kit.

Cunningham is charged with passing more than 100 worthless checks, with many store owners, O'Donnell said, getting stuck as many as three times.

INDEPENDENCE DISCUSSED
PARIS (AP)—High level talks were held Saturday in Paris and Saigon on the French government's July 3 offer of greater independence to Laos, Viet Nam and Cambodia—the three associated states of Indochina.

Veteran Beats Boat In, Upsets Others Aboard

DETROIT (AP)—Angelo Tzezi fancies himself quite a swimmer. The 24-year-old Korean war veteran stood on the deck railing of an excursion steamer in the Detroit River and shouted: "I can beat this boat ashore."

He did, too, but as he swam up to the dock, police arrested him. His unorthodox manner of leaving so upset the other passengers, police said, that he'll be charged with disturbing the peace.

BONN, Germany (AP)—West Germany's Parliament completed ratification Friday of the London agreement settling \$3,270,000,000 of German debts with 19 countries.

Reds Renounce Turkey Claims

ISTANBUL, Turkey (AP)—Russia, in an exchange of notes with Turkey, says she has "renounced" previous territorial claims against her Balkan neighbor and "Recognized" earlier demands to share control of the strategic Dardanelles. The Turkish government replied over the weekend that it "noted with satisfaction" the official Soviet declaration. The Soviet note was sent May 30 but not made public until yesterday.

Wife Files 10th Divorce Suit Since 1940

LOS ANGELES (AP)—For the 10th time since 1940 Susan B. Harshman, 62, has filed suit for divorce from Harry T. Harshman, also 62, a retired real estate broker. Her latest petition accuses Harshman of striking her, knocking out her teeth, scratching her, threatening to kill her, kicking her.

The Harshmans were married Feb. 29, 1940. She filed her first divorce suit the following October, then dismissed it.

She since has filed—and dropped—divorce actions in 1942, 1943, 1944, 1945, 1946, 1947, 1950 and 1952.

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Hottest spots Sunday were Thermal and El Centro in southeastern California, with 112 degrees.

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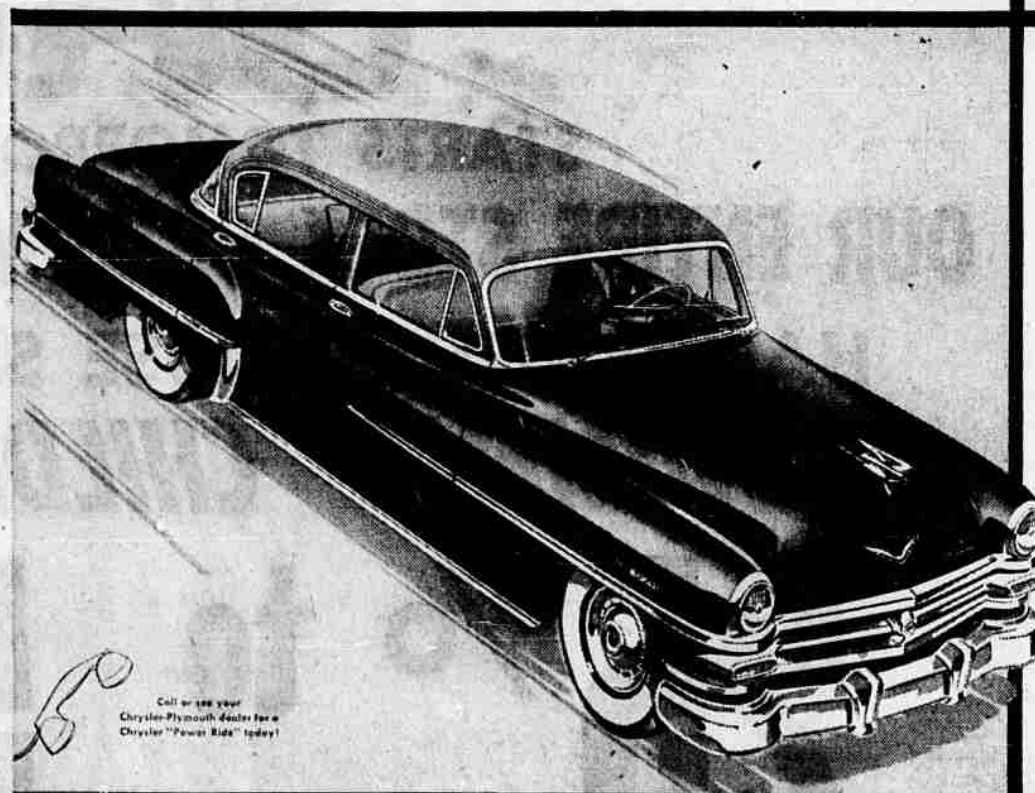
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
