Cutting Down Ring Deaths Work Of Man Who Never Had a Scrap

NEW YORK (NEA) — Boxing records will never mention the name of Dan Golomb.

The 31-year-old New Yorker never wore a pair of gloves in ring combat. Yet for two years he has been carving his own little niche in the back-busting business' history — one that should be remembered for a long time.

It was two years ago next month that George Flores was killed in the Madison Square Garden battle pit.

Public press and publicity-seeking legislators shouted for reforms. Once more there were cries for the abolishment of professional prize fighting.

While everyone talked about safety in the sour science, only Dan Golomb did something about it.

The young manufacturer's first problem was the glove. The mittens that had been handed down for 40 years were made of crude animal hair, stuffed haphazardly in the center of two pieces of leather. During a fight the hair would part. The fighters would be punching with practically bare knuckles. If the hair didn't separate by itself, the fighter or a second would see that it did.

Golomb developed a safety-guard glove. The same animal's hair was processed with a special adhering rubber and shaped into a fist. It was inserted as a unit into the pocket of the glove, sewed in place. Exhaustive tests by every known method demonstrated that the padding would not separate. The armed forces, National Boxing Association and the Amateur Athletic Union made the safety-guard glove mandatory.

Golomb readily made the idea available to all manufacturers.

The result is that now every glove in the country is constructed this way.

There hasn't been a major injury since its adoption.

Several weeks ago, the New York State Athletic Commission asked manufacturers to design a glove that would reduce the number of cut eyebrows and cheeks. Golomb came up with what the New York board calls a "no-cut" model. This glove has a shorter thumb and an over-sized punching surface. The glove prevents thumbing, too, has proven perfect in tests. Robert K. Christenberry, high New York mogul, in the next few weeks is expected to make it compulsory.
