**Langer Asks Emmons Probe**  
 WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Langer (R-ND) told the Senate Tuesday it ought to investigate accusations made against Glenn Emmons of New Mexico, appointed by President Eisenhower as Indian commissioner.  
 "Either he embezzled \$60,000 or helped to create a shortage in his bank or he didn't," Langer shouted to the Senate.  
 Langer did not mention the bank involved nor did he enlarge upon the circumstances, but Sen. Anderson (D-NM) said Monday Emmons' country bank had failed during the depression '30s and Emmons had reorganized it and paid off all debts.  
 Langer insisted that at least two persons have said they will testify under oath to the accusations.  
 Sen. Goldwater (R-Ariz) said the complaints against Emmons were unfounded "fishmonger's stories," adding that "they were never anything more than a third person's deliberate lies against a gentleman."  
 Reading an editorial from the Santa Fe New Mexican in which Langer was described as a "two-bit politician," Langer stormed that he was going to speak at length in the Senate about the charges if the nomination weren't sent back to the Senate Interior Committee.

**Oregon Farmer Raises Teasels, Other Odd Crops**  
 CORVALLIS (AP)—Oregon's farmers pick up a half million dollars a year from specialty crops of which the non-farm public has little knowledge.  
 Take teasels, for example. The growing of teasels is, says a report from Oregon State College, one of the less well known farm activities. Teasel flowers have a hook-like surface when dried and they are used to raise the nap on wool by combing it.  
 Wormwood, too, is an Oregon specialty crop with such diverse uses as in a preparation to keep moths out of clothes, an to give flavor to absinthe, an alcoholic drink.  
 But those two, along with the raising of dill seed, ginseng, seed sweet corn and a few others, account for only about \$50,000 annual income. Nearly a half million dollars, though, comes from sugar beet seed and production of dill for oil.  
 The whole farm income last year in Oregon was about a half billion dollars—most of it from the standard principal crops and from livestock.

## Bobbysoxers' Bobby Wagner Gets Only \$350 A Week

**HOLLYWOOD** (AP)—Here's news. Robert Wagner, No. 1 boy with the bobbysoxers and star of his studio's biggest pictures, earns a paltry \$350 a week and isn't complaining.  
 Of course, \$350 a week may seem like a sizable chunk of change to you and me, but it's small potatoes in the movie world. Especially for a lad like Bob Wagner.  
 He is currently the top man on all the fan magazine polls. The mall shop set goes for him with a devotion that recalls the palmy days of Van Johnson and Frank Sinatra. His studio, 20th Century-Fox, has taken a tip from the teen-agers and put Wagner in top billing. He recently finished "12 Mile Reef," a wide-screen epic of sponge fishing filmed entirely in Florida.  
 Now he's playing the title role in "Prince Valiant," a super-budget Cinema Scope film in which he'll be surrounded by Janet Leigh, Debra Paget, Sterling Hayden, James Mason and a flock of top-notch actors. All of them will doubtless be making more money than the star of the film.  
 "I'm not complaining," said the handsome 23-year-old actor. "I'm grateful to the studio. When I came

here four years ago, I didn't know the first thing about acting. They took a chance on me, and I couldn't have had better training."  
 "Every picture I have been in has been a top attraction, with the exception of two. That's the kind of buildup you can get only at a major studio."  
 "But don't get the idea that young Wagner is going to allow himself to be exploited. He's too hot to let that happen."  
 "I could probably get a new deal from the studio right now," he remarked. "But time is in my favor. My next option period is in April. By that time, '12 Mile Reef' and 'Prince Valiant' will be released. Then I will be in a better bargaining position."  
 "Prince Valiant" alone is worth five million dollars to me as far as my future career is concerned. It is a natural, the kind of picture that comes once in a lifetime for an actor."  
 So while Bob is waiting for the big money to roll in, he is learning how to be a movie star and live on \$350 a week. That's harder than it sounds, according to him.  
 "By the time I pay my agent's 10 per cent, rent, insurance, clothes taxes and other expenses I find I have nothing left," he remarked. "And for 12 weeks out of the year,


I don't earn any salary."  
 He decided he needed a manager and consulted the business agent who handles such stars as Humphrey Bogart and Dick Powell.  
 "If you can't save any money on \$350 a week, you probably couldn't save on \$60,000 a year," the moneyman told him. "Do you realize that some judges earn as much as you do and yet are able to maintain nice houses and cars, put their children through school, etc.?"  
 Bob hired the man to take care of his pay check and now he's on a strict budget. "I couldn't get an extra quarter to see an earthquake," the actor sighs.  
 But he doesn't have to worry. Despite present-day economy, his bosses will probably be coming up with a new contract soon. Reason: so the studio will have seven more years of his services, instead of the present four.  
 "That's all right with me too,"

said Bob. "When the new contract is over, I'll be 30. If I have continued to grow, I'll be in a position to knock off really big money as a free lancer."  
 No doubt about it, here's a kid who's going to get ahead.

## Judge Pauses Mid-Case To Hail City's Traffic Record

Judge Frank Blackmer had occasion to bring the city's so-far good traffic record to the attention of citizens Tuesday morning when Mrs. Harold Freeman was arraigned for ignoring a stop sign.  
 "The city of Klamath Falls is proud of its record," the Judge said, and pointed to the city's 1952 and 1953 traffic accident chart.  
 "In 1952 there were 112 accidents, 13 injuries, 1 death; in 1953 there has been 413 accidents, 9 injuries, 1 death. Many accidents can be avoided if people always stop at stop signs."  
 A complaint had been signed against Mrs. Freeman by Mrs. Walter Thorne, 1717 Siskiyou, wife of Police Officer Walter M. Thorne.  
 Mrs. Thorne testified that Mrs. Freeman was driving east on Lincoln as the Thorne car traveled north on 9th. According to Mrs. Thorne, the Freeman car was "traveling at a high rate of speed."  
 "Mrs. Freeman made a left turn on 9th after failure to stop at the Lincoln and 9th streets intersection and we almost collided," Mrs. Thorne continued. "My car was full of children, and it is a miracle there was no accident."  
 Young Alice Thorne, who has a

learner's permit, was driving her parents' car at the time. She also testified that she did not see the Freeman car until it had turned into 9th in front of her, "traveling at a high speed."  
 Mrs. Thorne said she had two more witnesses, Mr. Virgil F. Churchill, 390 N. 9th, and another man, a driver of a Nehi Beverage truck. Neither of the men were in court at the time.  
 In defense, Mrs. Freeman declared that she "came down Lincoln, made a complete stop, shifted into low and turned up 9th. I did not see the Thorne car," she said, "but I saw a taxi behind her."  
 Virginia Freeman, 14, also testified in defense of her mother. Judge Blackmer said the court would take the case under advisement and reach a verdict at a later date.
