118 Unregistered Guns Found Close

NEW YORK (AP)—Raiders from the district attorney's office yesterday uncovered a cache of 118 unregistered guns in a building facing the back entrance of New York City police headquarters.

Where the guns—foreign and American revolvers and automatics of various calibers—came from and for what use they were intended was not immediately known, the prosecutor's office said.

A licensed gunsmith and a manufacturer of police bills were arrested on charges of violating the weapons law.

Food Relief Grips Reds

BERLIN (AP)—A million packages of free Western food threw East Germany's Communist rulers into a frenzy today.

Soviet High Commissioner Vladimir Semenov, in a blistering diplomatic note, called the mammoth relief program a U. S. plot to "enlist Fascist hirelings and criminal elements" for a new anti-Red revolt in the Russian zone.

He demanded that U. S. High Commissioner James B. Conant immediately stop food gifts to hungry East Germans because these were "illegal and incompatible with the elementary demands of maintaining public order."

But in West Berlin, thousands of workers were set to wrapping the million-fold packages of foodstuffs for delivery on the Iron Curtain border here beginning next Monday.

Unused Artistic Water Tower To Be Renovated

ST. LOUIS (AP)—St. Louis is going to spend about \$10,000 to renovate an 83-year-old water tower which hasn't been used for 40 years.

Why? City Water Commissioner Thomas S. Skinker said yesterday he'd rather spend the money than risk a storm of public protest over razing of the landmark.

The tower was built in 1870 in the open countryside. Now it stands 154 feet high in the middle of a North St. Louis intersection. Years ago a city water commissioner drew the wrath of area residents and art lovers because he wanted to tear the tower down.

The tower, when built, was considered to be the largest perfect Corinthian column in the world.

The supplies came from a West German government reserve maintained in this isolated city since 1949 to protect it against a new Russian blockade. The reserve will be replenished by donations from the United States, where President Eisenhower offered 15 million dollars worth of free food to hungry East Germany on July 10 and stuck by it after Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov denounced the offer as "a clumsy propaganda maneuver."

A high American official said the Russian protest would be rejected flatly.
