 In fact the firm threatened to accuse AFL Cannery Workers of violating the state's new anti-picketing law.
 The pickets disappeared when the new law went into effect Tuesday, but they left behind their equipment and a shack they used as picketing headquarters. On the shack is a sign announcing a strike in progress. The firm said this was a violation of the law.
 The union secretary, C. C. Evanston, said the picketing equipment was left there because the union might decide to resume picketing.

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Would you like to see a Broadway show on the movie screen?

London Papers Take It Easy On Princess Despite Action

LONDON (AP) — The romance of Princess Margaret got little attention in most London newspapers Thursday despite the government's move to clear the way for her marriage.
 Such newspapers as the Times, Daily Mail and Daily Telegraph did not even mention Group Captain Peter Townsend in connection with the decision to amend the regency laws.
 The Daily Express was the only newspaper commenting editorially. It criticized the government for declining to shift royal responsibility from the princess.
 The Express apparently believes she should be allowed to marry the divorced Townsend and sit in the event of Queen Elizabeth's death before the heir to the throne, 4-year-old Prince Charles, reaches 18.
 Townsend is 38 and the Princess 22. He was the wronged party in a divorce action last year, but the Church of England, closely associated with the throne, frowns on the remarriage of divorced persons.
 Of the London papers only the Daily Mirror — which has been conducting a poll on whether Margaret should be allowed to marry Townsend — gave him prominent notice in covering the news of the government announcement to the House of Commons.
 Neither Margaret nor Townsend was mentioned in Commons. However, Acting Prime Minister Richard A. Butler could have been referring to no one else when he expressed hope for an end to "deplorable speculation."
 Meanwhile, Princess Margaret serenely carried out her royal duties, increased somewhat by the slight illness of her mother, Queen Elizabeth. She inspected gardens for the Queen Mother, and Wednesday went to Southampton to start a drive for the erection of a YWCA hostel which is to bear Margaret's name.
 In Brussels it was said Townsend was carrying out the normal, unexciting functions of an Air Attache at the British Embassy. He was sent abroad on the new assignment two days before Margaret returned from an official tour of Rhodesia.
