Two Canadian Mills Burn

VICTORIA, B. C. — Two sawmills were destroyed by roaring flames in British Columbia early Thursday. Total damage was estimated at more than \$500,000.

At Leechtown, 30 miles from Victoria, helpless volunteer firemen watched as flames, leaping 100 feet in the air, destroyed a big Sooke Lake Lumber Co. mill and threatened surrounding timber stands.

Preliminary estimates placed damage at more than \$500,000. Besides the mill, which produced 25,000 board feet of lumber, each eight-hour shift, 12 railway cars and nearly one million feet of cut timber, half of it valuable dry pine for export, were destroyed.

Meanwhile, flames clearly visible in South Vancouver destroyed a sawmill and lumber piles on Mitchell Island in the Fraser River, owned by Fraser View Sawmills Ltd. A \$20,000 planer mill was destroyed at the same plant three weeks ago.

Five volunteer fire brigades battled the blaze but were unable to save the building. Loss was estimated at \$125,000.

Singh Kartar, company secretary, said cause of the outbreak was unknown.

Shakespearean Roughed Up

ASHLAND — Dennis Cassidy, Shakespeare can be rugged, but his discovery was perhaps more spectacular than most.

In a recent rehearsal of the Roman tragedy, "Coriolanus," Cassidy found that instead of making his regular exit through the wings of the stage in Ashland's outdoor theater, he was forcibly ejected over the rail of the apron of the stage.

"Coriolanus" is a play much given to mob violence, and in one particularly rowdy scene, involving some 30 members of the company, Director Allen Fletcher has the "mob" fighting with swords and with fists, milling around furiously, then making a rapid exit. No one watching the practice session knows how it happened, nor does Cassidy himself, but just as the last of the mob disappeared off-stage, someone saw Cassidy's feet, sticking straight up, emerging from the hedge which surrounds the apron of the stage on three sides. He was pulled out unhurt, but shaken a bit by the fall and scratched slightly by the hedge.

"Coriolanus" is one of the 4 plays being presented by the festival this season. It opens Aug. 1.

Included will be the closing of 2.33 miles of Crescent Lake secondary highway, 34 miles east of Oakridge and grading of an additional .47 miles.

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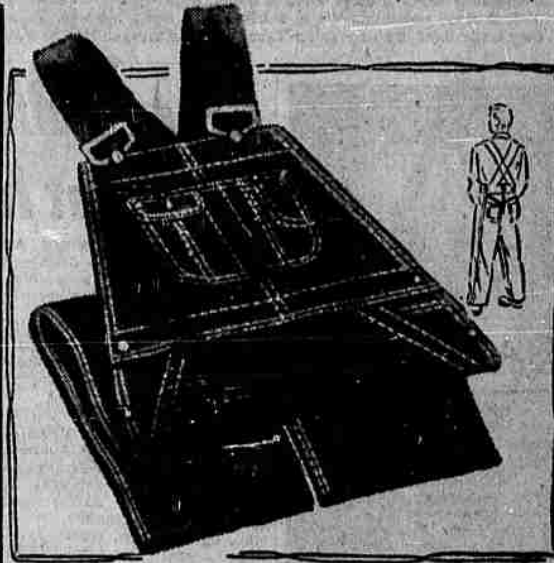
