CHICAGO (AP) — Moderate selling pressure sent grains down on the board of trade Thursday. The market couldn't find much in the news to provide a defense against the selling. At the outset some buying appeared in feed grains because of the firm manner in which July contracts were closed out Wednesday. But this demand soon dried up. Hedging, good weather for the growth of crops and apparent progress being made in Korean truce negotiations backgrounded the selling. Wheat closed 1/4 to 1 cent lower, Sept. 1.98 1/2, corn 1/4-1/2 lower, Sept. 1.47 1/2-3/4, oats unchanged to 1/4 lower, Sept. 74 1/2-74, rye 2 to 2 1/2 lower, Sept. 1.30 1/2-1/4, soybeans 1 3/4-2 1/4 lower, Sept. 2.55 1/2-2.55, and hard 3 cents lower to 12 cents a hundred pounds higher, Sept. 10.77.

US Pea Sale Deemed Okay

WASHINGTON (AP) — A House agriculture subcommittee reported Thursday it found nothing illegal about the sale of 80,000 tons of government-owned peas at a loss of \$6,257,197. The subcommittee also said there was no evidence of political or personal favoritism in the negotiated sale of the surplus as feed to three West Coast firms. The subcommittee investigated after Rep. Shelley (D-Calif.) questioned the propriety of the transactions in a House speech May 28. Commodity Credit Corp. officials were criticized by the subcommittee for "extremely poor judgment" in agreeing not to sell any more peas for feed on the West Coast for 12 months.

The subcommittee also recommended that a general public announcement be made in the future when the CCC is willing to negotiate for the sale of surplus commodities at less than the quoted price.

In this case, however, the subcommittee said others in the seed and feed business knew of CCC's willingness to negotiate and might have acted if they desired.

The General Accounting Office reported to the subcommittee that the sale was made to three buyers in April at \$30 a ton when the last quoted price was \$50 a ton. CCC's book cost, including storage and transportation, amounted to about \$110 a ton.
