JUDGE D. E. VAN VACTOR

A cursory survey of the career of District Judge D. E. Van Vactor probably would indicate that he was a "jack of all trades." But it would also show he was master of one.

During the years that the judge served as district attorney for Klamath County, he established a record of convictions that would be hard to equal. Oldtimers around the Court House say more criminals, in the vernacular of the underworld, "copped pleas" than during the regime of any district attorney they can remember.

In the embryonic period of his career, Judge Van Vactor held a variety of jobs ranging from a deckhand on a river steamer to assistant credit manager of a large Portland department store.

Judge Van Vactor also served with distinction in two World Wars but hastens to say he wants nothing to do with a third one.

Dayton E. Van Vactor was born in Goldendale, Wash., May 11, 1895. At the age of 16 he migrated to Spokane and got a job as a laborer for a paving contractor. A year later he was seized with an acute attack of wanderlust after reading the poems of Robert W. Service. Van Vactor signed up as timekeeper for a mine in Alaska. But he only got as far as Portland.

That was in 1916. The only job available was deckhand on the old steamer S. R. Lang that used to ply between Portland and Camas on the Columbia River.

Floating up and down the river soon grew monotonous, so our hero took a fling at theater. He didn't become an actor. The manager of

the old Heilig Theater in Portland hired him to work high up in the fly gallery above the stage. From there he got a birdseye view of the performances of some of the greatest stage stars of that era.

Next came a stretch of selling classified advertising for the Portland Oregonian and slinging rivets for the Northwest Steel Co.

In November, 1917, the future jurist enlisted in the army and a few months later was shipped overseas to help "make the world safe for democracy." He was a member of E Company, 87th Engineers. He saw action in a dozen major battles.

After Pearl Harbor, Van Vactor was again in the army. This time he was a captain. He organized and trained the 6th Airborne Squadron which participated in the invasion of Normandy and fought its way across France. The judge returned to the United States a lieutenant colonel.

Between the two wars, Judge Van Vactor was graduated from Northwestern Law School in Portland in Klamath Falls. In 1949 he was elected district attorney. In July 1952, he resigned that post and was appointed district judge by former Gov. Douglas McKay.

While discussing his career as a prosecutor, Judge Van Vactor said:

"Prosecutors sometime forget it is not only their duty to see that the guilty are punished but also to protect the innocent. It has been said many times that it would be much better to have 10 guilty men go free than send one innocent to prison."

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Hollywood Hopes President Will Sign Tax-Removal Bill

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Hollywood had its eyes on Washington this week. There was more movie news going on in the nation's capitol than here.

Two items of vital interest to the movie industry were making progress in the legislative halls. One was the provision to drop the

30 per cent tax on film theater admissions. Filmmakers were holding their breaths in hopes the measure will be signed by the President. It could make the difference between sink or swim with hundreds of film houses.

The other measure would put an end to the bonanza by which certain film stars have been able to pay no income tax on their salaries provided they remain out of the country for a year and a half.
