

DOUBLE-RING SERVICE READ IN FIRST NAZARENE CHURCH

The First Nazarene Church was the setting for another lovely Klamath Falls wedding, when Frances Jean Wright and Franklin W. Elzner exchanged vows in a double-ring ceremony July 12. The Rev. Wesley Crist read the service at 3 p.m. in the presence of a large gathering of relatives and friends.

The attractive bride is the daughter of Mrs. James W. Wright, 2122 Reclamation; and the bridegroom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. F. J. Elzner, Malin. Their wedding is of interest throughout the Klamath Basin, where both families are well-known.

Lighted tapers in floor candelabra illuminated the effective arrangements of white gladioli, which were used as a background and also formed an arch over the altar proper.

Mrs. Wesley Crist, pianist, played incidental wedding music and also accompanied Jean Adams soloist.

Escorted by Truman Nelson, her brother-in-law, who gave her in marriage, Jean was regal in an exquisite gown of traditional white, fashioned of imported Chantilly lace over satin. Scalloped detail at the neckline featured an interesting outline of lace over illusion, which tapered into the snug fitting lace bodice. Long fitted sleeves of lace were pointed at the wrists. The bouffant skirt was styled with two wide panels of pleated nylon tulle bordered with scalloped lace cascading from the waistline. A matching Chantilly lace bonnet with clusters of lilies-of-the-valley at each temple held her fingertip veil of illusion. She carried a white Bible centered with a white orchid arranged with stephanotis and white satin streamers. Her floor length gown of Nile green over taffeta was styled with a full skirt dotted with tiny pink blossoms, which also accented her becoming hat. Stephen Steward was ring-bearer.

Lincoln Elzner served his brother as best man, and ushers were Wilmer Allers, Earl Erwin, Malin; Bill Wright, brother of the bride; and Brent Hedberg, Bill and Brent also served as candlelighters.

Mrs. Wright chose an afternoon dress of aqua silk with aqua and
