## Wash. Demos Back Hells

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP)—The Washington State Democratic Central Committee expressed approval, during a meeting here Saturday of the proposed development of Hells Canyon on the Snake River under the Reclamation Bureau's comprehensive plan.

A resolution adopted said in part:

Although application has been made by Idaho Power Co. that they be granted the right to construct three low dams on the Snake River, there is absolutely no assurance that these dams will ever be developed.

"Even if all three were constructed, they would result in a firm power increase of only 680,000 kilowatts, whereas the Hells Canyon Dam would produce an increased firm output of 1,124,000 kilowatts."

The committee also criticized the current Republican administration for many of its campaign pledges, particularly relating to agriculture, and opposed transfer of all or part of the Washington-Alaska District office of the Internal Revenue Bureau from Tacoma to Seattle.

## Mrs. Abernathy Is One Of Few Women Court Reporters

It would be a brave man, indeed, who these days would stand up and be counted among those old "mossbacks" who still believe "a woman's place is in the home."

Ever since they wrested the right to vote from the "stronger sex," the women have been forging ahead in all lines of endeavor that a few decades ago were reserved exclusively for men.

During World War II, the public began to hear of the marvelous exploits of "Rosie the Riveter" and "Stella the Steamfitter."

Yes, m'lady has certainly knocked off a flock of good jobs and some persons claim it won't be long until lowly man will be relegated to washing dishes and baby clothes.

But there's one field in which women have been slow to catch on—court reporting. This is a highly technical trade in which a misplaced comma or a couple of transposed words is said to be enough to make Blackstone, the father of jurisprudence, turn over in his grave.

Out of the thousands of official reporters working in courts all over America, comparatively few are women.

One of these is in Klamath Falls. She is Mrs. Doris Abernathy, who records the proceedings in District Judge David R. Vandenberg's court. Mrs. Abernathy, wife of a Klamath Falls optician and mother of three children, says hers is the "most fascinating work in the world."

Mrs. Abernathy is a native of Molson, Wash., seven miles south of the Canadian border. She spent most of her girlhood in Bend and was graduated from Linfield College.

## UN Assembly Meets Aug. 17 To Set Up Political Parley

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—The U. N. General Assembly will meet three weeks from today to tackle the next big hurdle in the Korean problem—setting up the special political conference.

The conference provided for in the armistice agreement must meet within 90 days. Its chief job will be to try to transform the armistice into a permanent peace. Just what subjects will come up remain to be decided.

The 10-nation General Assembly will determine which nations will have a seat at the conference and will fix the time and place it will meet. Some delegates want the Assembly to work out the conference agenda too, but others have indicated they want to leave that to the conference itself.

The call for the assembly meeting on Aug. 17 went out quickly to members during last night, but Assembly President Lester B. Pearson of Canada and other leaders thought it best to allow ample time for private consultations before the formal meetings begin.

Pearson expressed the hope that some plans might be agreed upon informally before the session opens. If this is done, Pearson said, the meeting might be concluded in a week or a little more.

The U. N. received formal notification of the armistice at 8:48 p.m. (PT)—37 minutes after the conclusion of the Panmunjom signing. U. S. Delegate Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., informed Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold orally and later, before television cameras, handed him a letter with the notification.

"Let us thank God and fervently pray that this armistice heralds a lasting peace," Lodge said.

Hammarskjold said: "I wish to express the firm con-
