Hall State Victor In Rifle Championships

The Oregon State Rifle Championships, a meet Klamath Falls grabbed from Portland, drew 48 entries over the weekend on the Oregon Tech Range with Ray Ickes of Berkeley, Calif., and Klamath's Bill Hall capturing top honors.

Ickes was grand aggregate champion, scoring 478 of a possible 500. Hall's 475 score was good enough for the state title. Out-of-staters were not eligible for this honor.

The State Championships, an annual event in Portland since 1930, was held at Klamath Falls for the first time.

Seattle and Portland renew their longtime baseball rivalry Tuesday night, opening a series that is crucial to the Rainiers who are hoping to bolster their sagging Pacific Coast League stock in the eight games at Portland.

Hunting Changes Revealed

WASHINGTON (AP)—Elimination of a ruling prohibiting shooting within half a mile of baited areas is a major change in hunting regulations for the 1953-54 season for doves, band-tailed pigeons, rails and gallinules, Secretary of the Interior McKay said Monday.

McKay said shooting hours with certain exceptions are the same as last year.

General shooting hours for rails and gallinules will be one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. However, shooting must cease one hour before sunset when the birds are hunted coincident with the hunting season for waterfowl.

Scoter eider and old-squaw ducks may be taken from one-half hour before sunrise until one hour before sunset, except on the opening day of the season, when the shooting begins at noon.

Doves and pigeons may be hunted in Pacific states from one-half hour before sunrise until sunset except in California where shooting begins at noon on opening day.

By flyways, season dates, bag and possession limits and any special regulations affecting individual western states, follows:

Rails and gallinules: daily bag and possession limits, 25 sora and 15 others (with the "others" not more than 15 in the aggregate of rails, other than sora, and gallinules). When permitted to be taken during the waterfowl season they may not be hunted after one hour before sunset.

Mourning or turtle doves, daily bag and possession limits, generally 10. Oregon and Washington Sept. 1-Sept. 15.
Band-tailed pigeons, daily bag and possession limits, 6. Oregon and Washington Sept. 1-Sept. 30.

Layne Chopped From Top Ten in Ratings

NEW YORK (AP) — Rex Layne of Lewiston, Utah, has been dropped entirely from the latest list of heavyweight title contenders by Ring Magazine.

Nat Fleischer, editor of the magazine, announced that Layne, once regarded as a real title threat, had been removed from the top ten of his division because of his loss to Earl Walls of Edmonton, Alberta. Walls was ranked No. 6. At the same time, Bob Baker of Pittsburgh fell to eighth place as the result of his knockout loss to Bob Satterfield. Harry (Kid) Matthews of Seattle retained his No. 9 rating.

The main changes in the heavier classes saw Jacques Hairedein of France gain the No. 9 spot in the light heavyweight division, replacing Dennis Powell of Wales, and Randy Sandy move into the middleweights.

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Trucks, Roberts Top Loops

NEW YORK (AP) — Virgil (Fire) Trucks, one of the season's pitching surprises, and the always redoubtable Robin Roberts boast the lowest earned run averages in the major leagues.

Earned run averages compiled by the Associated Press show that the 34-year-old Trucks, who has won eight in a row since joining the Chicago White Sox in mid-June, tops the American League with a 2.50 earned run mark. He has given up only 45 earned runs in 162 innings.

Roberts, 26-year-old ace of the Philadelphia Phillies, heads the National League with a 2.28 slate, on 56 earned runs in 221 frames.

Bob Lemon of the Cleveland Indians is second in the American League with a 2.66 earned run average.

Southpaw Eddie Lopat of the New York Yankees (10-2) is third at 2.74.

Hovt Wilhelm, last year's National League pace-setter, is runner-up to Roberts with a 2.34 mark.
