

Allied And Red Armies Begin Pulling Back From Front Line

SEOUL (AP)—Allied and Communist armies today began pulling back from the front line across the Korean peninsula, according to United Nations forces, including South Korean troops, started withdrawing at daybreak. Chinese and North Korean Communist units were seen pulling back during the day.

Each side must withdraw two kilometers — about 1 1/2 miles — from a demilitarized buffer zone across Korea.

Far behind Red lines, the Allies began evacuating islands off both the east and west coasts of North Korea. The islands had served as radar station points, ground control stations for air strikes against the Communists and for air-sea rescue operations.

In keeping with the armistice signed Monday, the battlefront withdrawal must be completed by 10 p. m. Thursday. The Allied-held islands must be evacuated by 10 a. m. Friday.

In the early hours of the armistice no violations or incidents were reported. At the 8th Army briefing of war correspondents, a staff officer said the last infantry action was a patrol clash at 2:30 a. m. Monday on the eastern front — 19 hours before the truce became effective.

While Allied and Communist soldiers moved freely in the open Tuesday, the joint Allied-Communist Military Armistice Commission held the first meeting at Panmunjom to begin supervision of the truce.

Gen. Mark W. Clark, U. S. commander, completed signing copies of the truce document — done that and been taken north Monday and signed by the Red high command — and flew back to his Tokyo headquarters.

The U. S. Command armistice team, headed by Lt. Gen. William K. Harrison, was disbanded and the members and staff headed for other assignments. Harrison went to Tokyo with Clark to resume his job as Clark's chief of staff.

The 21-mile-wide buffer zone will be marked off on its southern and northern boundaries with marker posts and aerial observation points at numerous intervals and observation posts.

On the Western front, the U. S. 1st Marine Division began pulling back its front-line units at 6:30 a. m.

Marines quit their bunkers to give up many hard-won positions in the neighborhood of Bunker Hill and Outpost Berlin.

They took with them all equipment and limber and in some cases demolished the bunkers with explosives.

Marines reported that unarmored Chinese wandered through the new buffer zone and "came close enough to our bunkers to ask for a cigarette."

They didn't fraternize with them, the Marines said.

The Red, waving flags, went to work in full view of the Marines to clean up the battle area around their positions and pick up their dead.

Red China's Peiping radio reported that withdrawal of the Communist side would be completed by the Thursday deadline.

From the Central Front, Associated Press Correspondent John Randolph reported that the U. S. 3rd Division and other units pulled back some supporting units, but that up to Tuesday afternoon the front-line troops had not been withdrawn.

Randolph said the withdrawal would be made soon and would be carried off like a "fighting withdrawal without the fighting."

He said there would be a rear guard at all times, a screening force and troops in blocking positions.

"The whole idea," Randolph said, "is to provide utmost in military security, taking an extremely cautious view. The withdrawal will be as if we were under fire."

"Every piece of material that can be salvaged will be taken," Randolph said.

Allied troops were under orders to leave nothing of value.

South Korean units, whose actions were in doubt until President Rhee announced Monday they would not obstruct the truce for the time being, also began pulling back.

On the Central Front, Correspondent Randolph talked with Lt. Gen. Reuben Jenkins, commander of the U. S. 8th Corps, after Jenkins had toured the sector by helicopter. Jenkins, who at times flew only 30 feet above the ground and on occasions only 200 yards from the Chinese Reds, said:

"There were Chinese in small clumps of 30 to 40 men on the hills. We could see no other movement — no trucks, and no artillery. The Chinese looked at us but made no gestures. Our own men looked up and waved at us. We could see that some of them were yelling to us."

Jenkins covered about 30 miles of Central Front territory on a flight which took him over such famous and fought-for landmarks as Yellowhead Ridge, Outpost Harry, Whitehorse Mountain, Triangle Hill, Sniper Ridge and the Kumhwa sector.

Jenkins said, "we began moving some of the ROK's (South Korean) front-line units off the line last night. The rest of the withdrawal will be completed on Wednesday. We plan to bring back every piece of material we can — including the logs in the bunkers. In a very few places we may have to blast or burn to make the fortifications useless."

Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor's 8th Army headquarters issued its final communique Tuesday morning covering action in the last hours of the war.

It was communique No. 1,407 and said that "fighting across the 150-mile 8th Army battlefront decreased considerably Monday" from the day before.

The 8th Army briefing officer, Capt. Donald F. Petersen, of Pierre, S. D., held his last briefing for Allied news correspondents. A dozen newsmen were on hand.

Petersen reported that the Communist side threw 44,724 mortar and artillery shells into Allied lines between 6 and 12 o'clock Monday night, the last four hours of war. It was a much higher figure than average.

Petersen reported the last enemy shell landed at 9:50 p. m. On the day after the armistice, identification was permitted of the following units as being on the line: the 1st U. S. Marine Division, the 2nd, 3rd, 7th, 4th and 45th U. S. Army divisions.

At the last war briefing, newsmen, one of the 12 correspondents asked Petersen, "who won?"

"I would not comment on that either on or off the record," Petersen replied.

American troops who have been wondering how long it will be before they go home found out Tuesday. The Army announced a new rotation system which will keep soldiers in Korea for 18 months beginning Oct. 1.

While the war was under way, rotation was based on a point system with troops on the front lines drawing more points each month than rear area soldiers.

The new system will send rear area troops home sooner, but soldiers who would have been in the lines will have to stay in Korea longer.

U. S. Navy headquarters in Japan, in a summary of a "strange war," said five American Navy vessels were sunk and 82 others were hit while operating in Korean waters. Four minesweepers and a tug were sunk.

The Navy called the conflict a "strange war" because ships were sunk and men killed and wounded "without participating in a single naval engagement."

Most naval action was within sight of the Korean Coast and within range of Communist shore batteries.
