Livestock

CHICAGO LIVESTOCK
CHICAGO (AP) — Livestock receipts were cut well below the forecast Tuesday in the wake of Monday's widespread declines. The price bolstering move was largely successful.

Hogs moved steady to 50 cents higher. Cattle and sheep also were steady to 50 cents a hundred pounds higher.

Most butcher weight hogs sold from \$25.75 to \$26.50. A few heavies were as low as \$23.00 and a few underweights as low as \$22.00. Most hogs took \$18.50 to \$23.50.

Most good to prime steers and yearlings sold from \$20.25 to \$28.25 and good to prime heifers from \$20.00 to \$26.75. Cows topped at \$14.50.

Spring lambs grading good to prime ranged from \$22.00 to \$25.50 while ewes were \$6.00 and below.

Salable receipts were estimated at 6,500 hogs, 6,500 cattle, 500 calves and 1,000 sheep.

TOKYO (AP) — The cease-fire line across Korea gives the Allies a little more than twice as much of North Korea as the Communists have of South Korea. U. N. Command headquarters said today.

The Allies hold 2,054 square miles of ground north of Parallel 38, mostly on the eastern two thirds of the peninsula. The Communists hold 975 square miles south of the parallel, in the Kaesong-Pannum-jom-Haeju peninsula area on the west.

CHICAGO (AP) — Wheat started out firm and then went into a slide on the board of trade Tuesday, sinking around 2 cents below the previous close at one time.

Demand for the bread cereal seemed apathetic. There was some disappointment over the fact Japan, while buying some American wheat, had gone to Canada for the bulk of her supplies. Austria and Ireland bought some corn.

This export business, along with light cash grain receipts helped to hold up the September corn contract. But other months eased.

Soybeans did lose much ground, being aided by slightly higher prices for cash soybean meal and oil.

Wheat closed 2 1/2 to 3 cents lower, Sept. 1.94 1/2-1.94 3/4, corn 1/2 higher, Sept. 1.45 1/2-1.46, oats 1/2 lower, Sept. 75 1/2, rye 1 to 3 cents lower, Sept. 1.20 1/2-1.21, soybeans 1 to 2 1/2 higher, Sept. 2.53 1/2-2.54, and hard 30 cents lower to 5 cents a hundred pounds higher, Sept. 10.95.

Weather

Most of the nation had fair weather Tuesday. However, some rain fell over the Rockies and the northern plains states.

Showers in the Rockies were light and scattered while more general showers and thunderstorms rolled through the Dakotas.

Slightly cooler air moved northward through Kansas and Iowa to Michigan. Otherwise, temperatures remained generally unchanged with warm, humid weather continuing over most of the southern half of the nation.

Coos Bay Area — Early morning fog and low cloudiness, but sunny afternoons. Bar winds northerly, reaching 25-35 miles an hour in afternoon. High of 68 Wednesday. Low Tuesday night 50.

Northern California — Fair through Wednesday except local fog on the coast. Little change in temperature. Northwest winds of 12-25 miles an hour near the coast.
