Letters By Modoc War General In Wilson Thesis

TULELAKE—Two letters, written by Gen. E.R.S. Canby, famous figure of the Modoc War, never before published, are included in the excellent history of the war years written by the late Hugh Wilson Jr., as a thesis at West Point and now on the market in the form of an attractive book.

The letters were written by Canby to his wife and were secured by the young writer from the U.S. Military Academy Library at West Point during his first year. Hugh later lost his life in a plane crash.

Publication of the book which contains also numerous pictures, a map of the war area in the Lava Beds and other interesting data, is designed to raise a scholarship fund to send worthy graduating senior boys to colleges or universities who otherwise could not attend.

Mrs. C. R. Aikins, chairman of the scholarship committee, who suggested the booklet to the high school PTA in presenting the first column today to Dan Crawford Sr. president of the Rotary Club during the luncheon hour, said:

"First we wish to honor one of Tulelake's finest young men by establishing a living memorial to him. Secondly, through funds raised by this project, we hope to provide opportunity for worthy boys from our high school to start at institutions of higher learning whose education might otherwise be limited to graduation from high school, and lastly, the committee feels that this book will fill a need in our community by presenting the story of the Modoc War of 1873 in a brief and concise form which can be quickly read."

The book with sturdy blue cover, lettering and an excellent white paper stock was printed by the Guide Printing Co., Klamath Falls. The engraving was donated by the Herald and News, the foreword was written by the Rev. Hugh Bronson, Brookings, formerly of Tulelake.

Jerry Phillips, Tulelake high school freshman drew the map. The book is dedicated to Hugh's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Wilson. It will be placed in several

Administration Critic May Get Late Tobey's Key Seat

WASHINGTON (P)—Sen. Flanders (R-Vt.), who has decared the administration "flooded" the Korean settlement, appears today to have first call on a vacant seat Committee.

Unless his colleague, Sen. Aiken (R-Vt.), should decide to claim the place, Flanders topped a list of GOP members eligible to succeed the late Sen. Tobey (R-NH) on the important committee.

Flanders has supported most of the administration's foreign policy programs but he told the Senate July 8 that "not everyone is in favor of ending the conflict in Korea with a dishonorable truce or on dishonorable terms."

Waiting in line behind Flanders with the choice of taking over the Tobey vacancy or any other that might arise are Senators Bricker

(R-Ohio), Ives (R-NY), Jenner (R-Ind), McCarthy (R-Wis) and Malone (R-Nev), in that order.

Members who have served longest in the Senate have priority claims on open committee posts, majority leader, exercised that claim to take a seat on the foreign

relations group for the first time this year.

The serious nature of Taft's illness has hit the Senate Republicans a hard blow organizationally.

Sen. Knowland of California, who has been filling in as Taft's personal choice to be acting floor leader, is looked upon by many of his colleagues as the logical man to continue in that job.

While Knowland has won praise for the way he has conducted the Senate's business, he has rubbed some colleagues the wrong way and might face opposition if the question of his permanent designa-

tion as leader arose. The Republican Conference elects the leader and some of his colleagues are saying that if there were a showdown they might prefer Sen. Dirksen (R-Ill) to Knowland. Dirksen has been less

enthusiastic about the administration's foreign policies than Knowland.
