must be made by 10 a. m. and

Entries will be open to all
amateur gardeners who wish to
exhibit. Only one exhibit may be
entered in any one class by any
one person. No exhibit can com-
pete in more than one class, but
an exhibitor may compete in as
many classes as he desires.

All flowers must be arranged by
the person in whose name the en-
try is made. All entries may be
placed by the arranger on the
specified table allotted to that class
as long as no other arrangements
are touched in the process.

After the arrangements of the
exhibits are closed for judging
the exhibits come under the jur-
isdiction of the show committee.
No one will be allowed to touch,
re-arrange or remove any of the
exhibits without the consent of the
chairman of the judges.

Decision of the judges shall be
final. Exhibits are judged, not
against each other, but against
perfection. No unworthy exhibit
will be awarded a prize. Judges
will disqualify any exhibit that
does not meet the requirements of
the class in which it is placed.

Awards given will be ribbons
for first and second place in each
class. There will be a sweepstakes
award for the exhibitor winning
the most points.

The show committee is not re-
sponsible for containers and other
property. All items shall be
marked with the owner's names.
Containers for the specimens will
be furnished by the Garden Club.

The flower show will be divided
into the following classes:
1. House plants.
2. Composition of flowering ma-
terial in combination with fruits
and/or vegetables.
3. Formal arrangements — 12
to 18 in.
4. Formal arrangements—under
12 in.

5. Arrangements in unique or
homemade container — basket,
ceramic vase, cord-covered bot-
tle, shell, driftwood, knots,
stones, etc.
6. Miniature Arrangements.
7. Wild Flower Arrangements.
8. Crafts and hobbies displays.

He was identified as Oliver Wendell Elliott and police said he signed a statement admitting he was an escapee from the Indiana State Penitentiary.
