Bees Make Snowballs

You don't need to be a Southerner to enjoy this honey praline dish. It is fashioned for all to enjoy. Honey on ice cream is an old favorite to those who have a touch of the gourmet in them. But here is a recipe for honey and ice cream that drolls the combination up a bit and makes it fit for party fare.

Coconut Snowballs with a Honey Praline Sauce could be the answer to a children's birthday party. Or it could serve as a refreshing dessert to a rather heavy meal. Or it would solve the problem of the after-the-dance refreshment for your teen ager's friends.

Look how easy it would be to make it prior to serving time. Ice cream is scooped into balls and rolled in coconut, then stored in your freezing tray. The honey praline sauce can be stirred together in a hurry and stored for future use.

If you wanted to have a little fun with the recipe, you could tint the coconut before you rolled the ice cream in it — red for Valen-

tine's Day, red and green for Christmas, or green for St. Pat's Day. And there is no rule that says you have to use vanilla ice cream; any flavor will do. Honey combines well with all of them.

COCONUT SNOWBALLS WITH HONEY PRALINE SAUCE

1 pint vanilla ice cream
1/2 cup shredded coconut, cut, plain or toasted
1/4 cup butter
2 tablespoons honey
1-3 cup brown sugar
Dash of salt
1/2 cup evaporated milk

For snowballs, scoop ice cream into balls and roll in coconut. Place in freezing tray of automatic refrigerator for about 1 hour. Makes 3 or 4 servings.

For sauce, melt butter in saucepan. Add honey, brown sugar and salt. Place over low heat and stir constantly until mixture bubbles vigorously. Add milk gradually and bring to a boil. Boil gently 2 minutes. Remove from heat. Serve warm over the coconut Snow Balls. Makes 1 cup sauce.

Salmon Salad Sandwiches Appetizing

Salmon sandwiches are easy for Mother. A can of salmon is a convenient and economical basis for delicious sandwich filling. Just open the can, drain the salmon mix with olives, celery and dressing and spread on fresh bread slices. It is all done in a jiffy, and it invites the most laggard appetites.

Canned salmon is a treasure of vitamins and minerals. It is rich in bone and teeth building calcium,

phosphorus and iodine and contains vitamin A, which helps prevent infection, and vitamins D, niacin and riboflavin, which aid growth.

SALMON SALAD SANDWICHES

1 1-pound can salmon
1/4 cup chopped stuffed olives
1 cup finely diced celery
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon lemon or lime

juice
1-3 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing
12 slices bread

Drain and flake salmon. Add chopped olives and diced celery; sprinkle with salt. Mix together lemon or lime juice and mayonnaise; add to salmon mixture; mix well. Spread on 6 slices of the bread; top with remaining 6 slices. Yield: 6 servings.



When Is A Shampoo More Than A Shampoo

When you look for a new dress what do you consider first? Both are important. No one wants a dress of poor quality, and certainly nobody will wear a gown that doesn't have style.

Have you ever considered that the same may be said for hair? Styling is important, especially this year when there are so many different coifs to choose from. But the material is also important. That is why, no matter how you interpret current hair fashions, you must start with clean hair.

Shampooing is often taken for granted. Girls think of it as something to be done every week or ten days according to their individual schedule. And that is that!

But shampooing isn't cut and dried. You can wash your hair just to get it clean, or you can wash it to make it beautiful. There's a difference.

A hair beauty treatment starts with vigorous brushing before the shampoo. Brush up and away from the head, allowing the bristles to sweep across your scalp. The brush helps to loosen dry flakes of skin which may appear on the scalp after winter months of steam heat and tight hats.

Vigorous, however, does not mean rough. Vigorous brushing makes the scalp feel warm and tingly. Use a brush with bristles strong enough to separate the hair without flattening out, strong enough to dust each individual hair.

Then shampoo. One of the new type detergent shampoos that suds instantly makes the business of hair washing easy and simple. Whether you use a cream, jelly or liquid type, they cleanse thoroughly and easily in water of any hardness. Your hair seems to have more color, too, since shampoos of this type leave no residue to cloud natural hair color.

Always towel dry your hair after a shampoo before setting it. The dryer your hair is before setting it in pin curls, the prettier it will be. One of the largest New York beauty salons will not set hair until it is almost dry, and the beauty and lasting quality of their hairstyles are the envy of

those who do not know this secret. As further aids to hair beauty, never use combs with broken teeth, or sharp hairpins or clips. And try arranging your hair with a brush instead of a comb. Hair brushed with a firm hand falls into place beautifully—a comb can be used later for smoothing.

Take shampooing out of the hairwashing category. Make it a hair beauty treatment.

Double-ring ceremonies are expected to account for 85 per cent of all marriages in 1953, jewelers report.
