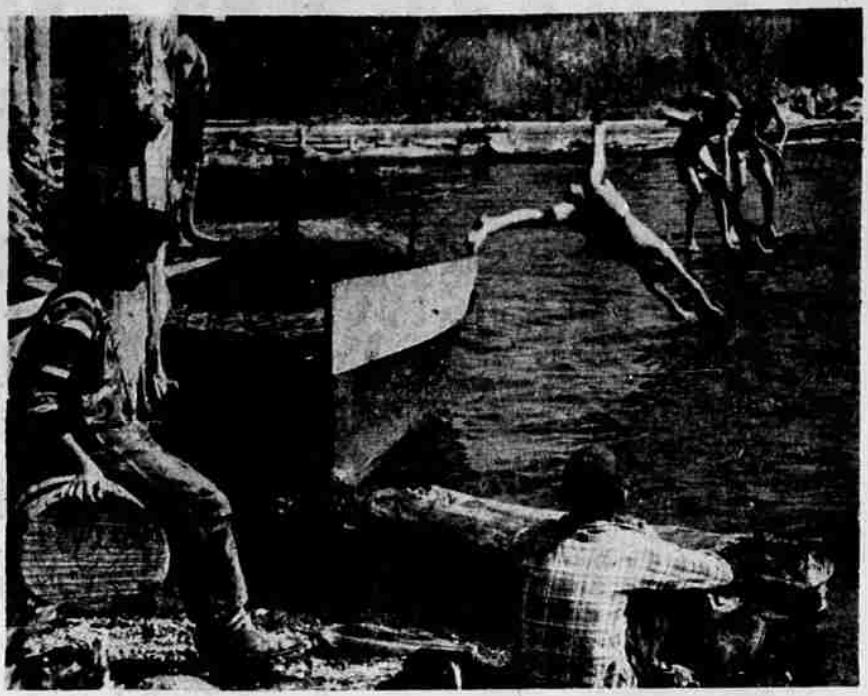

Selling Need Of Charter Reform To Revision Committee Will Be Difficult For Patterson

 SALEM (AP) - Gov. Paul L. Patterson, who couldn't sell the Legislature on calling a convention to write a new state Constitution, will have just as hard a job convincing the 17-member Constitutional Revision Committee.

This committee, which will give the 1955 Legislature recommendations as to what should be done to modernize Oregon's 94-year-old charter, held its first meeting here Tuesday. And it didn't warm up to the convention idea.

It seems to agree with the governor that the Constitution, already amended 96 times by the people, needs an overhauling.

But most of the committee members seem opposed to the governor's idea of having a convention, elected by the people, write a new Constitution.

Some members would like to have the Legislature submit to the people a series of amendments to bring it up to date.

Some think it would be even better to have the Legislature write a new constitution and put it before the people. If this were done, the people would either have to accept or reject the whole document.

Some lawyers think, however,

this latter method would be illegal. They claim that only a convention could submit an entirely new document.

The committee seems to distrust a convention, fearing it might come up with a worse Constitution than the state now has.

The legislative members of the committee think the Constitution has too many restrictions on what the Legislature can do. Those restrictions were put there by the people, who might not like to remove them.

For instance, the Constitution won't let the Legislature put an emergency clause on any tax measure. This makes all tax measures subject to the referendum, and gives the people the last word on new taxes. Most legislators would like to be able to pass tax bills without having them go to the people.

Some lawmakers believe the Constitution contains more law than constitution, and they would like to take all this law out of it. They point to the liquor by the drink amendment, claiming it should be

in the law books instead of in the Constitution.

The Constitution contains obsolete matter that is ignored, such as fixing the governor's salary at \$1,500 a year. He gets 10 times that much.

Another obsolete provision says that in elections, the people shall vote by voice vote, the state has had the secret ballot for many years.

It also provides penalties for giving or accepting a challenge to fight a duel.

Some believe the Bill of Rights should be expanded by giving equal rights to women, giving labor the right to organize and bargain collectively, and giving absentee soldiers the right to vote.

Others would give more power to the governor, letting him appoint the other top state officials who now are elected.

And some would make it harder to amend the Constitution. It now can be changed by a majority vote of the people.

Gov. Patterson told the committee the state will have a big growth, and that the Constitution should be changed to meet this growth.

The committee faces a huge job, as it will have to analyze each section. At the same time, it will have to study all of the court decisions interpreting each section.

After all, the Constitution is only what the courts say it is.

The governor still thinks the state needs an entirely new Constitution, and he'll probably tell the next Legislature that it's No. 1 on his list of proposed legislation.

State Wheat Allotment Set

PORTLAND (AP) - Oregon's wheat allotment acreage for 1954 was assigned by the State Production and Marketing Administration Tuesday and the figures were made public late Wednesday morning.

The total of 881,845 represents the total available to "old wheat farms" - those on which wheat has been planted the last three years.

The original state quota was 863,762 acres, a cut of about 29 per cent from this year's planting. However, some counties got an addition from the national reserve, adding 30,208 acres.

Edward G. Robinson Makes Over House For Paintings

 HOLLYWOOD (AP) - "These are my children, but they rule me. I've had to make over the whole house just to please them."

Short, sour-faced Edward G. Robinson gestured around his spacious Beverly Hills home. The walls were covered with paintings of the great names of modern art. These were his children. Like all parents, he complained about what they had cost him. But he indicated he wouldn't part with any of them.

"I've just hung them again," he remarked. "They've been out on tour in such places as the National Galleries in Washington. Now I'm getting acquainted again. I've missed them."

Folks sometimes find it hard to picture Robinson as an art fancier, since he has specialized in playing mugs in the movies. They were magnificent. His latest adventure into film crime is to play a murderer in "The Glass Web."

Despite his career tendencies, he is one of the foremost private collectors of art in the world. The walls of every room in his house are adorned with rare and beautiful paintings.

"Do you even have them in the bathroom?" I asked.

"Come and see." Sure enough, there were three sketches and an oil.

"The house was decorated entirely differently," Robinson continued. "I had to make it all over so the paintings would look their best. Then I built the gallery outside, where the badminton court used to be. I had hoped that would give us some privacy in the house. Unfortunately, it didn't turn out that way."

The actor conducted a tour of his home, pausing to marvel at a Renoir nude ("Isn't it alive?") or to pat the head of a Degas ballerina

cast in metal ("She's quite a girl!").

Robinson exhibited a famous portrait by Van Gogh, a gorgeous scene of Tahitian horse riders on a pink beach by Gauguin and some posters by Toulous Lautrec. He explored popularizations of the talented dwarf's life: "he was in reality a lusty man, not a weakling," Robinson protested.

During the tour, the actor explained how he had started with his art collection: "I had always loved art as a kid. I would haunt the museums and galleries and read everything I could find on art. Of course, I never dreamed that I would be able to buy some great paintings some day."

"But along came the movies and made it all possible. I started with three paintings—a Monet, Degas and Picasso. They were magnificent things, and it was well I started out with good art. Then the dealers realize that you don't want anything second-rate."
