'Neutralizing' Of All Korea To Be Talked By Dulles, Rhee

WASHINGTON (AP)—The possibility of seeking a permanent Korean settlement on the basis of "neutralizing" the whole country probably will be discussed with President Syngman Rhee when Secretary of State Dulles meets him in Seoul next week.

The neutralization idea has received some consideration in the State Department. According to some reports, it has been mentioned to Rhee and he indicated disapproval. However, although formal U. S. policy toward Korea is presently developing along different lines, the neutralization idea is considered to be still open for exploration.

Dulles is going to Korea for the stated purpose of negotiating with Rhee on the kind of security treaty which the United States and

South Korea should make.

Dulles' problem is either (a) to try to discover some formula for quick negotiation of Korean unity at the conference starting by late October, or (b) to try to persuade Rhee to give up his idea of going to war again to achieve unification by force. American officials believe Rhee could not do that without powerful assistance, which they say he would not have.

Dulles this week ruled out concession to Red China on membership in the U. N., and officials say privately the United States would never agree to let Formosa go under Communist rule. Thus the possibility of bargaining with the Reds to give up North Korea appears virtually nonexistent. This situation has stimulated fresh interest in the idea of neutralization.

Nehru Suggests Pre-Assembly Meeting With Korean War Reds

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—Indian Prime Minister Nehru urged today that the major U. N. powers in the Korean War meet with the Chinese Communists and the North Koreans in advance of the Aug. 17 meeting of the U. N. Assembly. The Assembly will plot the framework of the post-conflict political conference, to be held within 90 days of the armistice signing, but Nehru said the views of the Chinese and Korean Reds should be considered. Neither are

members of the United Nations. "The proper course would be for private consultations between the great powers concerned, enabling them to put forward an agreed resolution," the Indian leader told a news conference. "The composition and functions of the political conference are not a mere matter for the United Nations General Assembly," he declared. Nehru suggested a three-point approach to the conference: 1. "At the beginning, it should deal with the question of Korea itself and not take up a multitude of difficult questions and get itself entangled." 2. "It is desirable that it (the conference) not be too big." 3. "It should be more a round table conference and approach matters informally, not in a rigid way."

Iran Heat Wave Leaves 158 Dead

TEHRAN, Iran (AP)—An 11-day heat wave along the Persian Gulf in southern Iran has caused 158 deaths, according to an unofficial count.

The searing heat eased somewhat yesterday as the temperature dropped to 104 degrees in the shade. Newspapers reported the mercury had touched 181 in the sun earlier.
