Canada Against Seating Veto

SHELDON, N. B. (AP)—Foreign Secretary Lester B. Pearson implied last night that Canada will fight any attempt by the United States to veto seating of Communist China in the United Nations.

Pearson, who is president of the current U. N. Assembly, told a political campaign rally here that Canadians cannot expect a speedy solution to such problems as Peking's demand for a U. N. seat.

"Only yesterday, I read in the paper that Mr. (U. S. Secretary of State) Dulles said the United States would use the veto if necessary to bar the Peking regime."

"Well, there are other members of the U. N. who would feel differently about this drastic action, especially if we can bring about at this political conference an honorable peace."

Dulles told a news conference Tuesday that if the admission of Red China should reach a Security Council vote, the United States would consider itself free to wield its veto.

Held for a further hearing on the same date in \$25,000 bail each were:
David Dubensky, also known as David Davis, 46; Sherman Labovitz, 29; Walter Lowenfels, 56; Thomas Nabried, 51; and Benjamin Weiss, 33, all of Philadelphia.

Nabried, the only Negro in the group, wore a white T shirt, Weiss sported a tan T shirt very similar to those issued by the government to servicemen. Lowenfels had on a blue sports shirt and carried a sports jacket over his shoulder.

Kuzma was described by the FBI as "associated with the Communist party since the middle 1930s." Labovitz as "a onetime Communist party organizer." Lowenfels as "Communist party candidate for Pennsylvania representative in 1940 and former manager editor of the Pennsylvania edition of the Worker." Nabried as "organizer of the Communist party in eastern Penn-

sylvania and Delaware." Weiss as "treasurer of the Communist party in eastern Pennsylvania and Delaware for a number of years." and Dubensky-Davis as "onetime member of the National Committee of the Communist party."

Only Dubensky-Davis was represented by counsel at the hearing. His bail was set at \$25,000.

From the hearing, the six were taken to Philadelphia's Moyamensing Prison to await bail or the further hearing.

Lowenfels was seized at his summer cottage in Weymouth, N. J.

The others except Kuzma—were arrested at home.

The six were charged specifically under the Smith Act with conspiring to advocate the overthrow of the government by force. Their arrests brought to 87 the number of Communist Party officials

seized under the act since 1940. The Justice Department said.

At the hearing before Carr, all six kept tight lips except Weiss, who asked, "Is this a formal arraignment?"

He was told by Carr it was just a preliminary hearing.

Express Rates Upped 15 Pct.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Interstate Commerce Commission has voted 8-2 to give the Railway Express Agency an average rate increase of 15 per cent, expected to yield about 55 million dollars a year.

The agency had asked an average rate increase of about 23 1/2 per cent.

Not counting yesterday's boost, the commission since 1946 has approved express rate increases averaging 84.4 per cent.

Austria Gets Big Concession

VIENNA, Austria (AP)—The Soviet today made their greatest concession yet to occupied Austria. They agreed to pay their own occupation costs—a step the United States took six years ago.

Announcement of the change—beginning Aug. 1—was delivered to Austrian officials by A. M. Timoshenko, Counselor of the Soviet Embassy in Vienna.

Previously the Austrian government has paid the costs of Russia's 44,000 troops in Austria. Unless similar concessions are forthcoming from France and Britain, their occupying forces still will be paid for by the Austrians.

The latest Russian concession coincided with a Soviet note to Austria asking the government of the occupied country to drop its support of the Western-proposed "short draft" independence treaty. WASHINGTON (AP)—Maj. Gen. William J. (Wild Bill) Donovan, who headed the supersecret Office of Strategic Services during World War II, has been selected as ambassador to Thailand.

Donovan, now retired and practicing law in New York, is a native of Buffalo.

His nomination to succeed Ambassador Edwin F. Stanton, was sent by President Eisenhower last night to the Senate for confirmation.
