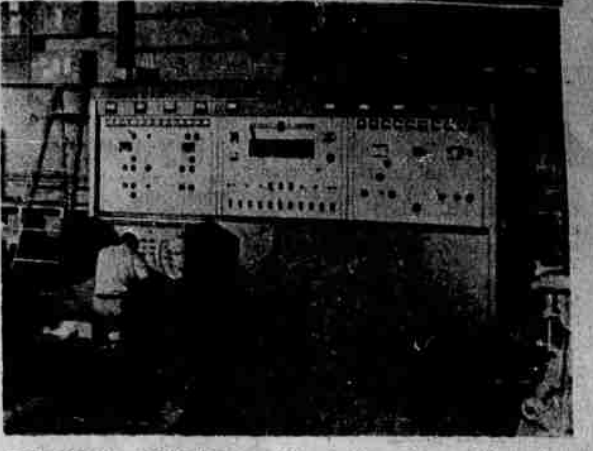

PANMUNJOM (AP)—The Communists handed the United Nations Command \$1,400 today in 28 U. S. \$50 bills. They will get back \$37.44 in change. That \$1,362.56 was the Communists share of the cost of printing maps of the demilitarized zone.

PAYOFF OKAYED BONN, Germany (AP)—A law to pay four billion marks (952 million dollars) to persons persecuted by the Nazis on German soil won final parliamentary approval Friday.

St. Paul Fires Last Shot Again

YOKOSUKA, Japan (AP)—The heavy cruiser St. Paul fired the final shot by an Allied warship only two minutes before the signing of the Korean truce, the Navy said Friday. That projectile was photographed by Rear Adm. Harry Sanders, commander of Cruiser Division 1. The St. Paul also claims the distinction of being the last major U. S. naval unit to fire a salvo at the home islands of Japan in World War II.

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
