Those Who Count Fleas On Squirrels See DDT Losing

LOMA LINDA, Calif. (AP)—Scientists here have been counting the fleas on squirrels. They announced today that DDT has lost its leadership as a potent flea killer.

Fleas are well known carriers of plague and other deadly diseases. The Army is anxious to find a powerful insecticide that will efficiently destroy them.

The College of Medical Evangelists' School of Tropical and Preventive Medicine has been conducting the project. Raymond Ryckman, head of the department of entomology, has issued a report showing that three new insecticides are many times more effective than DDT in destroying disease-carrying fleas and other insects.

'Voice' Gets New Director

WASHINGTON (AP)—Theodore C. Streibert, New York radio executive, is taking over the tough job of directing the American Overseas Information program just when it is to be overhauled.

Streibert, former board chairman of the Mutual Broadcasting System, was nominated Thursday by President Eisenhower to head the new United States Information Agency.

Saturday, this agency takes over from the State Department the work of the International Information Administration, including the Voice of America radio. It also will absorb other operations.

Streibert succeeds Dr. Robert L. Johnson, who is returning to his job as president of Temple University. Johnson resigned because of ill health after a strenuous five-month career as head of the information operation.

During that period, the agency was the target of heated criticism in Congress, particularly by Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.).

Monsoon Floods Disrupt 200,000

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—Summer monsoon floods have driven 200,000 villagers from their homes along the Ganges River in Uttar Pradesh state.

Reports reaching here today said the swollen river has spread over 300,000 acres of low land in the Gorakhpur district, 400 miles southeast of Delhi. Thousands of villages have been abandoned and 10,000 cattle stranded.

There was no report on the number of casualties.

Uttar Pradesh officials met yesterday in Lucknow, the state capital, to map a relief program.

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Senate, House Agree on Foreign Aid Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate-House agreement on the foreign aid budget early today removed one of the last remaining barriers to adjournment of Congress, but President Eisenhower's delayed request for a boost in the federal debt limit clouded the picture.

Administration lieutenants in the House forewarned no obstacle there to passage of a bill to hike the debt ceiling by 15 billion dollars to 290 billions. But in the Senate, there was glum talk that the session might have to be prolonged into next week.

Acting Republican Leader Knowland of California said he wanted to reserve judgment on when Congress could quit for the year. Before the debt limit request, he had been aiming at tonight. His Democratic counterpart, Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas, spoke of postponing adjournment temporarily.

A Senate-House conference com-

mittee worked until past midnight local time (11 p. m. EST) to reach a compromise agreement on a \$6,632,423,390 foreign aid money bill. Although there was some grumbling among the House conferees, Chairman Taber (R-N.Y.) of the Appropriations Committee said that "Why, certainly" the House would accept it. Final Senate okay is also needed.

The total amount is \$699,315,866 less than Eisenhower asked. It includes \$4,530,457,999 in new cash and \$2,101,964,391 in authority to spend funds appropriated by previous Congresses and not yet obligated.

The compromise is \$455,734,211 above the amount originally voted by the House and \$2,805,812 less than the Senate had approved early yesterday.

Ten of the 13 government money bills already have gone to the White House, and two more remain in conference committees seeking to resolve Senate-House differences.

One, carrying funds for the State, Commerce and Justice Departments, has been deadlocked for weeks over one issue: whether or not to provide funds for federal aid to airport construction.

The other, a catch-all measure carrying funds for such things as civil defense, and overseas information program and Korean rehabilitation, passed the Senate only yesterday. No major difficulties to agreement were apparent.

Three major legislative proposals in the administration "must" list, along with a minor one or two, are still in the congressional machinery. None appeared to present an insurmountable obstacle to early adjournment.

One is the President's request for special authority to permit the immigration of Iron Curtain re-

ugees and other aliens. Senate-House conferees arranged to meet today to try to iron out differences. The Senate bill would admit 209,000 in the next three years; the House bill, 217,000 in the same period.

A bill to extend the Reciprocal Trade Agreements Act for a year beyond last June 12 has been deadlocked in a Senate-House conference for weeks. The Senate has balked at a House provision to add a seventh member to the Tariff Commission.

Still in conference, too, is a famine relief bill which the President asked, but Senate-House differences are relatively minor.

Two potentially troublesome measures were cleared to the White House last night.

Most Democrats lined up against the compromise version of a bill providing for administration of resources in the continental shelf, the submerged area beyond historic state boundaries. They objected to the dropping of a Senate provision to devote the revenues to federal aid to the schools. But they lost, 45-43, and the bill went to the President's desk.

Both the House and Senate also completed action, by voice votes, on an administration bill to permit the sale of 29 government synthetic rubber plants to private industry.

As for the proposed boost in the 275-billion-dollar debt limit, which Eisenhower formally asked only last night, there was a bare possibility the opposition would be stamped in the desire to adjourn.

French Air Blows Go On

HANOI, Indochina (AP)—French fighters and bombers kept up heavy attacks today on the Communist-led Vietnamese rebels' supply bases and lines of communication with Red China.

Among their targets was Thai Nguyen, 40 miles north of Hanoi. It is often referred to as Ho Chi Minh's administrative capital, but the French are not sure where the elusive Vietminh chief is.

Other key targets were Tuyen Quang, 70 miles north of Hanoi, and the vicinity of Hoa Binh.

Hoa Binh, 40 miles southwest of Hanoi, is believed to be the principal regrouping point for part of the rebel force which invaded Laos in April, then withdrew less than a month later.

KALAMAZOO, Mich. (AP)—Western Michigan College has granted bachelor of arts degrees to two Michigan women who began their collegiate studies nearly half a century ago.

Mrs. Grace S. Rosso of Grand Haven, a teacher, who matriculated in 1909, said she has only one regret. She never learned square dancing.

Mrs. Mabel Blair began her collegiate studies at the old Cass County Normal School in 1900. She has completed a course that included running, tumbling and volleyball.

At 65, Mrs. Blair says her ambition now is to earn a doctorate.
