Weather Study to Go On Despite Dead Scientist

O'NEILL, Neb. (AP)—An intensive Air Force weather study here will go on despite the crash of a helicopter which killed the project's top scientist and five others.

The helicopter, a big H18, plunged into a pasture yesterday and burst into flame.

The dead scientist was Dr. Guenter Looser, 40, one of the directors of the Air Force lower atmosphere research project.

Others killed were military personnel.

The flight was preliminary to the official start next Monday of six weeks of exhaustive wind research field tests.

Maj. Oscar J. Tibbets, project commander, said the study would definitely go on, though it might be delayed.

Dr. Looser, a German who came to this country after World War II, was a leading meteorological scientist. He had helped develop the V2 rocket.

Witnesses reported the helicopter crashed after it lost a rotor blade in mid-air. They said the fire which followed may have been due to magnesium flares carried by the craft.

The names of military personnel were withheld pending notification of next of kin.

SHA Gets Inter-Com System As Gift of Bishop Leipzig

The Most Reverend Francis P. Leipzig, D. D., Bishop of Baker City Diocese, recently presented Sacred Heart Academy with an inter-communication system for the convenience of faculty and students.

The gift, amounting to almost \$1,000, is now installed and in operation in all the classrooms, the gymnasium, front entry, kitchen and private rooms of the house.

According to Sister M. Lilloa, principal of the school, contact with the gym will be especially helpful during games or practices.

Two-way operation provides contact with 15 stations, and is adequate for installation of an additional 5 stations. Central control is located in the school office.

The sisters and students have expressed their appreciation to the Bishop for his generosity and interest.

"His Excellency has long been a leader of Catholicity and in education, with a keen interest in all schools of his diocese, and spares no efforts to aid both faculty and students," said Sister Lilloa in describing him.

Band Leader Sues For Tooting Ike

WICHITA, Kan. (AP)—A band leader is suing Sen. Frank H. Carlson (R-Kan.) and "all others concerned" for \$50,000 in connection with the Eisenhower campaign in 1952.

The suit was filed in District Court yesterday in behalf of Duke Andrews, head of a band known as "The Duke's Quintet."

The suit claims Carlson as "managing agent of the Dwight D. Eisenhower national Republican campaign" hired the group June 4, 1952.

The petition states the band worked 140 days but was not paid. Except for Carlson, the "others concerned" were not named in the petition.

House Probers Call Back Methodist Minister McMichael

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House Un-American Activities Committee today called back for more questioning a Methodist minister who vehemently denied any Red ties and denounced his first ousting as "Un-American" and "Un-Christian."

The Rev. Jack Richard McMichael, pastor of the Community Methodist Church of Upper Lake, Calif., came out of yesterday's stormy hearing saying:

"The whole procedure was based on a principle that would have condemned Jesus—guilt by association."

The lanky witness, quick in speech and a hard man to quiet, gave the committee what one member, Rep. Clardy (R-Mich.), called "an exasperating day."

During the hearing, the 36-year-old Georgia-born preacher asserted he is not now and never has been a Communist.

He shouted that two former Communists who branded him as a Red were "liars and perjurers" and "ought to be so charged and tried."

Reds List Two More Squawks

MUNSAN (AP)—The Reds accused the Allies today of two new truce violations.

The accusations came as the Korean Military Armistice Commission and other truce groups met at Panmunjom.

The Communists said military aircraft circled and reconnoitered over the zone Wednesday and Thursday.

Maj. Gen. Blackshear M. Bryan, head of the U. N. team on the commission, said the complaints would be investigated but they were not serious.

There was no indication yet whether the Allies would accuse the Reds of a violation following Air Force reports that large numbers of planes—probably MIG jet fighters—flew south from Manchuria into North Korea Monday night after the cease-fire deadline.

Armistice terms specify that only replacement armament is to be allowed into North or South Korea—and that under supervision.

A joint Allied-Red group discussed final details for exchanging prisoners, which is to begin next Wednesday.
