FORT KLAMATH — The Fort Klamath Community Methodist Church was the setting for a beautiful summer wedding solemnized Saturday evening, 7 p. m., July 18, when Diane Lee Bechtel, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard H. Young, Mitchell, Ore., was united in marriage to Neil Wesley Wilson, nephew of Mrs. Margaret Watson, Fort Klamath.

In the presence of a large assembly of friends and relatives, the young couple knelt on a white leather covered bench in front of the altar. A white latticed arch was fashioned of greenery and pink and white gladioli, and on either side of the wedding arch were large white floor vases of pink and white gladioli with tall lighted white tapers. The pews were marked with large bows of wide white satin ribbon.

The double-ring ceremony was read by the Rev. Edmund B. Stanton, new pastor of the Fort Klamath and Chiloquin Methodist churches, and marked a memorable occasion for the young minister, as this was his first wedding service, his present charge being his first pastorate.

Proceeding the exchange of nuptial vows by the young couple, Elida De Bortoli, Chiloquin, sang "Always" and "Oh Promise Me," with Mrs. Gerald Wolfe, Chiloquin, accompanying at the piano and also playing incidental music and the traditional wedding marches.

The Klamath District Flower Show will be held here, Sept. 9-10-11 in the city library club rooms, according to Mrs. Scott McKendree, district flower show chairman.

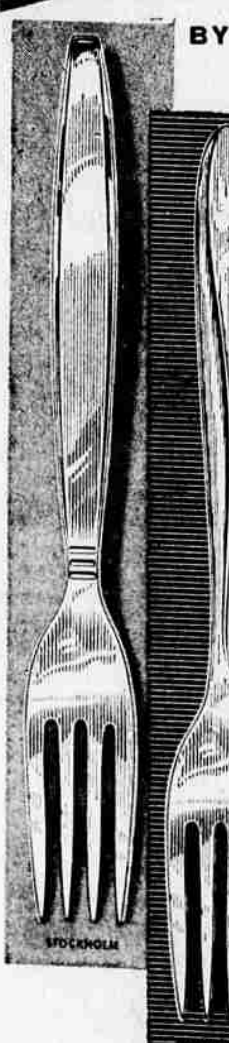
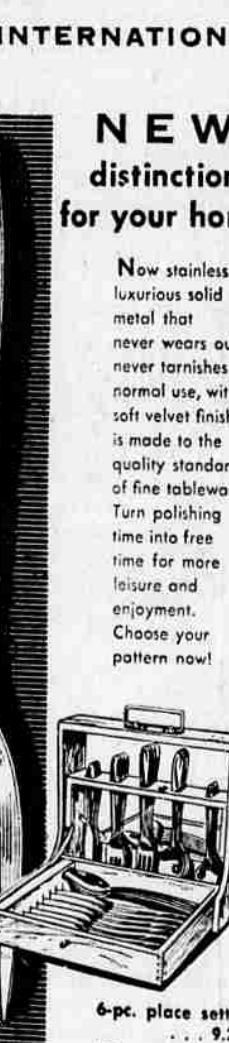
