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Still Wide Chasm Between Hopes, Realization of Real GOP in South

(Editor's note: President Eisenhower's election last November split the Democratic "Solid South" and raised Republican hopes for a two-party system in Dixie. Have the Southern Republicans capitalized on Eisenhower's popularity to build up party strength? Is a two-party system beginning to emerge? The Associated Press asked correspondents in 14 Southern and border states to answer these questions and others in assessing the South's political situation today. Here is the third of three stories reporting the conclusions. It is written by Don Whitehead, Pulitzer Prize winner who toured the South himself last year and accompanied Eisenhower on his Dixie campaign swing.)

WASHINGTON (AP)—There still is a wide chasm between Republican hopes for a two-party system in the Southland and their realization. But the gap isn't as wide as it was before President Eisenhower's election last November.

This sums up the findings of an Associated Press survey of the political situation in 14 Southern and border states eight months after the presidential election.

The 1954 elections will give a clue as to just how much influence Eisenhower's victory had in strengthening the South's Republican party, and whether Democrats who voted the Republican ticket have started shifting party allegiance.

Considerable attention is certain to be focused on the border states of Missouri, Kentucky and Oklahoma. They normally are Democratic but have vigorous Republican organizations. It may be any sharp trend toward a two-party system will become apparent first in the border areas.

Eisenhower carried Missouri by nearly 30,000 votes. Republicans won a slim majority in the state House of Representatives, and carried 4 of 11 congressional seats.

The Democrats won a U. S. Senate seat, held onto the governorship, and kept control of all state executive offices along with the state Senate.

AP Correspondent Larry Hall sums up the Missouri situation this way:

"Republicans... got a foot in the door in last year's presidential election, and kept control of all state executive offices along with the state Senate."

Perry Compton, Republican state chairman, is highly optimistic about the outlook. He predicts the GOP can gain two more seats in Congress and win control of both Houses in the Legislature.

"We have already started to organize for the campaign," he says. "The way things look now I think we can pick up both the 8th and 11th districts next year."

These were districts in which Republicans made strong showings. The 8th in Central Missouri is now represented by Rep. Morgan Moulder, Camden Democrat. The 11th in South Central Missouri is held by Rep. A. S. J. Carnahan, Ellsworth Democrat.

In Kentucky, the Republicans are hoping the Democrats will become so badly divided in a struggle for party power that the GOP will be able to capture the state.

Democrats now control the state government, six of the state's eight seats in the House at Washington, and one of the two U. S. Senate seats.

The Democratic fight is developing between A. B. "Happy" Chandler and the state administration forces of Gov. Lawrence Wetherby and Sen. Earle Clements (D-Ky). Chandler has openly challenged the Wetherby-Clements group and has announced he will run for governor in 1955. Already he's battling the administration in some state legislative races.

Republican State Chairman Edwin Denney concedes "We still have a long way to go to gain a 50-50 split with the Democrats."

But the Republicans for the first time have set up permanent local headquarters in several parts of the state. Denney is hopeful his party will gain in the state Legislature this year, pick up a seat or two in Congress in 1954, and elect a governor in 1955 if the Democrats split. Democrats control the state Senate 28-10 and the State House, 73-27.

Republicans will fight to keep Sen. John Sherman Cooper in his U. S. Senate seat in next year's election. One unknown factor is this effort is the political future

of former Vice President Alben W. Barkley.

Barkley is one of the strongest political figures in Kentucky history. He is being mentioned as a possible candidate for the U. S. Senate or governor. Whatever Barkley's decision, it will have an influence on the Republican fortunes.

From Oklahoma, AP Correspondent Dayton Blair reports: "Republicans in normally Democratic Oklahoma would like for President Eisenhower's popularity to help elect state GOP candidates next year but so far they haven't done much to start such a trend."

"After Oklahoma voted for the Republican presidential candidate last November, GOP leaders confidently predicted the one-party stranglehold Democrats have enjoyed since statehood would be broken. But they have been too busy up to this time with intra-party feuding to start work against the Democrats."

Patronage headaches resulting from the Eisenhower election have stripped the state organization of most of its harmony and probably the present troubles will not be ironed out until the state convention next February. This will make it late to concentrate on statewide organization."

Oklahoma voted for Republican presidential candidates in 1920, 1928 and 1952. The state never has elected a Republican governor and only a handful of state officials.

Many of the Republicans' troubles can be traced to deep-seated factional strife between State Chairman Floyd Carrier and Mrs. H. H. Sayre, national committee woman, on one side and Rep. Page Belcher (R-Okla.) and National Committeeman Bailey W. Vinson, Tulsa, on the other.

Blair writes: "The trouble dates back to the Republican national convention last year when Mrs. Sayre was aligned with supporters of Eisenhower and Vinson with Sen. Robert A. Taft in the fight for the presidential nomination."

"The Carrier-Sayre group scored a victory June 30 when they won a patronage dispute. It came up in a state Central Committee meeting where Carrier and Mrs. Sayre had a clear majority of support over Vinson."

In the fight, Carrier won confirmation of a new state party treasurer from Oklahoma City and thus took financial control of the party away from Tulsa, where Republicans traditionally are strongest in the state.

Blair says: "Tulsa Republicans have always furnished a large share of campaign funds and there is speculation the split will handicap fund raising next year."

On the other side, however, is a surge of activity by a group of young Republicans who are new faces in the party."

The Republicans did considerable precinct organization last year but very little has been done since the general election to keep the organization together and working.

In three consecutive elections,

the Republican candidate for governor has run a close race, losing twice by fewer than 20,000 votes and another time by 35,000 out of a total vote of about 500,000.

There is general belief that an effective precinct organization will give the Republicans a good chance to win the governorship.

UN AIDE—Rep. Frances P. Bolton (R., Ohio) is a new U. S. representative to the UN General Assembly which convenes in New York in September. Mrs. Bolton is at present a member of the important Foreign Affairs Committee.

TO GERMANY—Walter C. Dowling has been appointed U. S. deputy high commissioner for Germany. The career diplomat succeeds Samuel Reber, who is retiring from the foreign service.
