HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Christian Dior suffered a setback in his drive for shorter skirts today when the eight winners of the Miss Universe contest unanimously thumbed down his proposal.

The French designer shocked the fashion world with his new creations, which showed the skirt line as barely below the knee. Eleana Schiaparelli took up the challenge and lengthened her new dresses to 13 inches from the floor, even lower than last year.

Norman Hartnell, designer for Queen Elizabeth II, issued an edict that skirts would stay where they are—mid-calf. Hattie Carnegie sided with Dior.
