

Quotas For Wheat Eyed Over Nation

Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson followed the letter of the law when he recently called for a national referendum by wheat farmers to vote on whether or not national wheat marketing quotas should be established.

Any Nevada wheat producer with 15 acres of wheat or more is eligible to vote in the Aug. 14 wheat quota referendum. Local voting places will be established in each county. E. A. Settelmeyer, State chairman of the Production and Marketing Administration pointed out.

Throughout the nation wheat farmers will vote on whether controls will be used in marketing the 1954 wheat crop, and at what level the Government will support 1954 wheat prices. If quotas are approved by two-thirds of all farmers voting, wheat will be supported at 90 per cent of parity and acreage quotas will be established.

However, if farmers disapprove of marketing quotas, the support price will drop to 50 per cent of parity, according to law, and will be available only to farmers who comply with wheat acreage allotments.

A national allotment of 62 million acres for 1954 has been established by the Department of Agriculture. This acreage represents a reduction of about 16.5 million acres from the 78.5 million acres planted this year. The national acreage allotment is apportioned among the States, and the State allotments among the counties, on the basis of wheat acreage planted during the last 10 years.

The county allotments are apportioned among individual farms, with consideration in each case for the past acreage in wheat, the number of tillable acres in the farm, the crop rotation practices followed, the type of soil, and the slope and lay of the land. E. A. Settelmeyer stated.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture points out that marketing quotas cannot be in effect without acreage allotments. However, if marketing quotas should be disapproved by farmers, acreage allotments will be in effect for the 1954 wheat crop. Producers must stay within their established acreage allotments in order to be eligible for price supports.

Wheat Quota Meet Dates Corrected

The Wheat Quota Referendum has been set for Aug. 14, nationally. Statements were made in the Herald and News that the date in Klamath County would be the 20th of August.

Two polling places will be established for Klamath county, one at the Production and Marketing Administration, office in the Tower Theater Building, and the other at Bonanza. More information as to time and place of voting will be given.

Klamath County's allotment for 1954 is 12,529 acres. Keep in mind that the date is Aug. 14 and not 20.

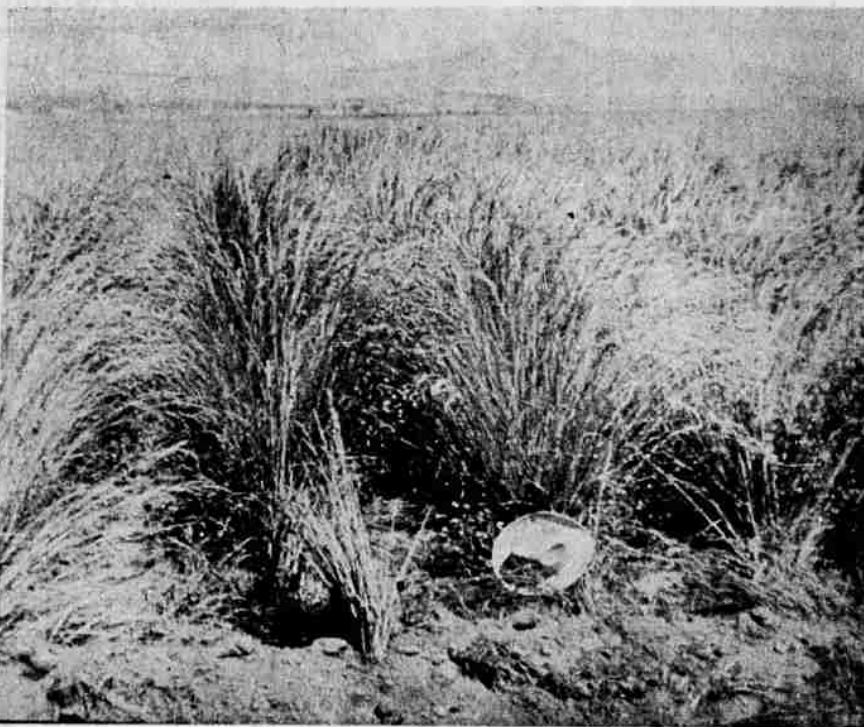

Alta Tall Fescue For Use As Seed Tried In Valley

Alta tall fescue is a grass being tried for seed production in Butte Valley in which several farmers have made small seedings under irrigation during the past few years. A seeding of tall fescue made by Howard Myers near Macdoel and harvested for seed the past two years shows yields in meetings with favorable cash returns per acre. Tall fescue should be seeded in rows for seed production and possibly has a place as a seed crop on land limited to early season irrigation.

A small seeding of tall fescue was made on the William Clement farm in Butte Valley in the early Spring of 1952. Nitrogen fertilizer at the rate of 40 pounds per acre was applied at the time of seeding. The field was sprayed in early Summer for weed control and row cultivated in late Summer. The fescue has been irrigated

twice during the summer of 1953. The seed will be harvested in August and prospects are good for at least 500 pounds of seed per acre.

4-H Summer Camp Proves Fun For Local Youths

Living in the out-of-doors was found to be great fun by 72 4-H club members. The forest service camp at Crescent Lake is the place these youngsters called their "home" from July 19 through July 25.

Each day was brim full of activities led by experts in each field.

Vern McDaniels, superintendent, State Forest Nursery, held classes in forestry; Rufus Cate, County Extension Agent, 4-H Club work in Jackson County inspired many would-be fishermen with his class in fly-fishing; Jim Hamer, State Game Commission, held some classes in wildlife and Francis Skinner taught many the art of riflery. Other instructors were Dolores Bracken, Klamath County Extension agent, Home Economics, handicraft; Mrs. Ralph S. Davis, Newberg, swimming and water safety; and J. D. Vertrees, Klamath County Agent, firemaking and plaster casts of plants.

You know that boys and girls do

not go to camp to be educated, but they cannot help it, because camp is his whole world to him for a week. It is his home, school, church, playground and gang; he has entirely new experiences in each of these fields. How can he help but learn? Here are some of the things that happen to the campers:

1. They learn to do new things.
2. They develop their democratic spirit.
3. They adjust socially—learn to voice opinions and recognize this right for others.

Campers learn these things through their activities and through the guidance of their counselors. The youngsters became quite efficient at braiding plastic slings into lanyards, necklaces and bracelets. Candlemaking was quite a popular craft, as was spatter painting.

Mary Wells, a camper from South Pole Valley, made a very nice little hanging basket from some sticks. She lashed the sticks together, lined her basket with moss, filled it with dirt and planted some pretty little plants in it. Other campers lashed together some sticks to make frames for pictures they make from pine cones, twigs, moss and pine needles.

Several campers learned to swim while they were at camp, and now they can have more fun than ever, paddling around in the water and be safer than they were before.

You should have seen the flies around that camp, I mean the artificial type used for fishing. McGinty bees were quite popular with the boys. The girls and the counselors enjoyed making special creations that were just pretty bugs to pin on a shirt or jacket.

The firebuilding class was one of special interest to many. The campers learned when, where and why to use a fire as well as how to build one.

Sheep Auction To Be Held

Registered beef and sheep from Oregon State college breeding stock will be auctioned August 20 at the OSO livestock pavilion, according to Dr. Fred F. McKenzie, head of the animal husbandry department. The auction begins at 1 p.m. Bids also be accepted by mail.

Five dwarf-free, registered yearling Hereford bulls top the auction list. Dr. McKenzie says the bulls have made rates of gain up to 100 percent above average—as high as 3 3/4 pounds gain per day.

Fifteen dwarf-free, registered Hereford cows and heifers have also been declared surplus to hold down the size of the breeding herd for genetic studies. Eleven of the animals are two-year-olds, and the rest are outstanding sires.

Seventeen registered yearling and two-year-old Hampshire, Romney and Southdown rams will be auctioned. All are out of good producing ewes and are by progeny-tested rams.

More than 125 commercial ewes Hampshire, Border-Leicesters, from three to seven years will be sold. All produced and weaned lambs in 1953.

Almost everyone went home from camp a better marksman than before. Rifery was the "thing" up for at our camp. The rifle range is quite a little hike from the main camp site, so missing the target did not cause anyone to fret.

The evening programs were the one thing, other than meals, which brought the whole camp together for awhile. Paul Bunyan stories taught us many things—how the Grand Canyon came to be and how the chipmunk got its stripes.

One impressive ceremony told us how 4-H was organized and what it means to us now. Four candles were lighted to symbolize the four H's of our program, head, heart, hands, and health. Each person with a candle related his H to a personal experience in clubwork and then all four candles lighted a huge bonfire representing the total 4-H program.

Each cabin presented a skit the last night of camp—showed us many talented actors and actresses.

Mrs. Sylvan Crume, Sprague River club leader was the dining room manager and Mrs. George Reiling, Poe Valley club leader, was a cabin counselor. Other counselors were Ida Sokraskoff, Nancy Pruitt, Linda DeLap, Kay O'Donahue, Ginger Martz, Carle Elliott, Sharon Davis, Elliott West, Jim Parker and Terry Hannan.

The food was delicious as all of us who were there can testify. Mrs. Elmer Langer and Mrs. Arthur G. Rust were the cooks and probably are the only ones who know whether the boys ate more than the girls or vice versa.
