Alcoholism Talk Tonight

The problem of alcoholism will be discussed by Fred H. Ross, at the Church of the Nazarene, Martin and Garden, 7:30 p.m. today. Dr. Ross appears under the auspices of the National Voice, America's oldest temperance weekly, now in its 83rd year of continuous publication. It is printed at Los Angeles.

The speaker has been pastor of the First Methodist Church of San Pedro for 25 years. He is a graduate of USC School of Religion, has been an evangelist for a number of years, an officer of Southern Holiness Association. During the First World War he served as a chaplain in the army. Ross is also a member of the American Legion, and for 20 years a Rotarian.

He was described by Bishop James Chamberlain Baker, San Marino, Calif., as an "effective crusader who will come to temperance work with a long history of conviction, fighting, devoted advocacy of temperance."

Dr. Ross is described as a "dynamic speaker, with an authoritative and scientific approach to the problem of making America sober."

'This Isn't the States But We're Doing Our Best To Speed You Home,' POWs See

INCHON, Korea (AP)—The thin blond soldier from New Jersey looked tired and scared when he climbed from a helicopter at Inchon and boarded a U.S. military bus.

But by the time he had drawn part of the pay he accumulated while in a Communist prison camp, composed a radiogram home and sat down to a big dinner of steak and french fried potatoes, Pvt. Joseph J. Hussey, 26, was grinning.

Hussey was typical of American prisoners classified as able-bodied by the Communists.

They arrived by helicopter at the 509th Army replacement center at Inchon to await a ship for the United States.

Hussey was the first to alight. He shook hands with two American generals and walked to a waiting bus.

At the replacement center he was assigned a bunk in a barracks type room. He carried a tray through a serving line at dinner time—just like any other soldier.

But the food was special. And the bunks had sheets, springs and mattresses.

There were Red Cross girls to help him send a message home.

Personnel did their best to make the men feel welcome. A sign at the helicopter landing strip said: "This isn't the states but we are doing our best to speed you home."

Maj. Gen. William S. Layton, commander of the Korean communications zone, said he thought the first shipload of Americans would leave for the United States in five or six days.

At the replacement center, the men were briefed by a captain on what facilities were available for their comfort—washrooms, showers, Red Cross clubroom, movies and USO shows. An Army paymaster looked in his records and

told one of the former POWs: "Sergeant, you have \$1,418 coming. How much do you want now?" The men were allowed to take up to \$150 of their accumulated pay in cash if they wanted and the rest in check or money order. Most of the returnees drew only \$50.
