with salt. Bake until fish is tender, about 35 minutes in moderate oven, 375 degrees. (Don't overcook.) Baste frequently with wine in which the fish was soaked, mixed with worcestershire sauce. Makes four large or six moderate servings. Especially tasty when served cold.

HUCKLEBERRIES MAKE SUCH GOOD EATING IN MANY WAYS

There's no berry to compare with Oregon's very own home-grown, hand-picked huckleberries. Next to eating them out of hand while strolling offside a trail, the best way we know of is to be a little more civilized and eat them out of a dish with a spoon with or without cream. If you're the type who puts sugar on grapefruit, then you'll probably sugar your huckleberries.

If you're looking for a recipe, here are several very good ones. **Huckleberry Cake**—Use a recipe for one-egg cake or a prepared cake mix. Flavor with 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind. Add 1½ cups fresh huckleberries to half the batter. Put the plain batter in a cake pan first, and the batter containing the berries on top. Bake according to cake recipe directions. Serve with huckleberry or lemon sauce.

Huckleberry Roly-Poly—Roll out shortbread with butter, best sugar or margarine and cover with sweetened huckleberries; 1-3 cup sugar to 1 cup berries. Roll like a jelly roll and bake about 40 minutes at 400 degrees.

Huckleberry Floating Island—Place alternate layers of soft-cooked custard and fresh ripe huckleberries in sherbet glasses. Chill and top with swirls of meringue or whipped cream.

HUCKLEBERRY SURPRISE PUDDING

2 cups fresh huckleberries
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1½ cups sugar
3 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 cup all-bran
¾ cup sifted flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1½ teaspoon salt
½ cup milk
1 tablespoon cornstarch
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup boiling water
Place berries in well-greased

8 x 8 inch pan; sprinkle with lemon juice. Blend ¾ cup sugar and butter; stir in all-bran. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt; add to shortening mixture alternately with milk, mixing well after each addition. Spread evenly over huckleberries. Combine remaining sugar, cornstarch and salt; sprinkle over batter. Pour boiling water over pudding. Bake in moderate oven 375 degrees, about 1 hour. Six servings.

PLENTIFUL OREGON PEARS GOOD IN MANY LIKE THESE
Fresh Oregon pears are plentiful and increasing in supply right along. Pears, unlike most other fruits are picked when they have reached a designated maturity, then allowed to ripen on the tree. When ripened under ideal conditions the juice of the pear becomes abundant, the flavor delicate and aroma fragrant.

If pears are not ripe when purchased, they may be ripened in a few days by leaving them in a cool, dry place at normal room temperature. After ripening, pears should be kept in refrigerator until ready to use.

Chilled ripe pears add a cool and refreshing touch to a luncheon plate. Bartlett pears, make many a fine drink, get themselves canned, make good pear honey, pear jam and if you've not made pear relish, now is the time to try our Piquant Pear Relish recipe.

Piquant Pear Relish—Wash 6 fresh Bartlett pears, 4 freestone peaches, 4 medium tomatoes, 1 medium onion, 1 medium green pepper. Peel fruit and tomatoes. Remove stones or cores. Finely chop fruits and vegetables. Combine in saucepan with ¾ cup sugar, ¼ cup lemon juice, 2 teaspoons salt, ¼ teaspoon cayenne, ¼ teaspoon cloves, ¼ teaspoon cinnamon; mix thoroughly. Cook about 45 minutes or until desired consistency, stirring frequently. Makes 6 half pints.

Year Pineapple Crisp—You serve this warm or cold with whipped cream or ice cream. Six servings. Combine 4 cups fresh pear slices, 1 8-ounce can crushed pineapple and 1 tablespoon lemon juice. Mix 1 cup sugar, ¾ cup flour and 1 teaspoon cinnamon; cut in 1-2 cup butter or margarine. Put half of pear mixture in 8-inch baking pan. Sprinkle half the sugar mixture

over it. Put in remaining pears and top with rest of sugar mixture. Bake in 375 degree oven for 35 to 45 minutes.

Bartlett Pear Jam—Wash and peel 8 Bartlett pears; chop finely and measure 5 cups. Place in saucepan and add 7½ cups sugar, grated rind and juice of 1 large orange and rind and juice of one large lemon. Bring to a boil and boil one minute. Add 1 bottle liquid fruit pectin and remove from heat. Skim if necessary. Fill sterilized jars and seal. Makes 8 half-pints.

HAM 'N CORN FRITTERS

Heavenly as corn on the cob is, perhaps you're ready for a change. Plan this to follow the next ham meal using leftover ham. Or you can finely dice canned luncheon ham. For that matter, you can substitute canned corn niblets or frozen corn.

1½ to 1 cup cubed ham
1 cup flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1½ teaspoon salt
2 beaten eggs
1½ cup milk
1 tablespoon melted fat
1½ cups corn, cut from cob
2 tablespoons chopped pimento
2 tablespoons chopped green pepper
1 teaspoon grated onion
Sift dry ingredients into mixing bowl. Combine liquids and stir into dry ingredients. Stir in remaining ingredients, including the ham. Drop from tablespoon into deep hot fat. Fry 3 to 5 minutes. Serve immediately.

GREEN OF CUCUMBERS

MAKE EMERALD SALAD
A cooling hot-weather specialty that is easy to make, lovely to look at. Uses plentiful cucumbers in green lettuce. Turn out on crisp green lettuce.
1 package lime gelatin
1½ cups hot water
2 teaspoons grated onion
1½ cup vinegar
1 pinch of salt
2 cups chopped cucumber
Dissolve gelatin in hot water; add other ingredients and chill until syrupy. Fold in 2 cups chopped cucumber. (As we've mentioned before, we never peel cucumbers, but you do as you like. Actually enzymes in the cucumber skin aid in their digestion.) Pour in molds or in a square pan; chill until firm. Unmold or cut in squares. Serve on crisp lettuce with mayonnaise. Garnish with fresh tomato wedges if you like, but we like the cool green look.

ENJOY MID-SUMMER FRUIT AND VEGETABLE VARIETY
Now is the hour to have variety plus in your fruit and vegetable

eating. With many kinds at their peak, many just arriving and some on their way out, the prices may not always be the lowest but quality and variety are certainly "tops".

THE FRUIT DEPARTMENT

The year's early Gravenstein crop has produced top quality fruit, according to the growers, and prices are reasonable. Keep some cold and crisp in your refrigerator for eating fresh. Tender and juicy, this variety of apple holds its shape and texture superbly under cooking processes. Appicots, berries with an accent on blackberries, cherries, peaches, pears, plums, melons (particularly cantaloup and watermelon), grapefruit, small oranges, and grapes are all available at fair to moderate prices. Bananas are frequently to be found at much lower than their usual price due to the abundance of other fruits and to their extreme perishability in the summer heat.

THE VEGETABLE DEPARTMENT

Good buys here include cucumbers, artichokes, corn, cauliflower, cabbage, celery, Bell peppers, lettuce, onions and white potatoes. Bunch vegetables are also in the good buy class. When shopping for fresh beets and turnips look for those that are smooth and blemish-free. When rough or ridged they may be tough and woody. Make sure the leaves are relatively clean and crisp so you can make use of them in making soup stock or eating as "greens". Medium length celery that is brittle and of good color makes the best buy in this vegetable. Corn is at its best right now, and sweet, juicy corn-on-the-cob just can't be beat as a hot vegetable for summer meals. Good quality tomatoes are plentiful. Choose those that are firm, well-formed and not over-ripe. Remember to wash and dry them before storing in the refrigerator.

Meat Department Busy—Beef continues to be the "the buy". Again we remind you to check this paper's advertising for the very best buys. Turkey supplies remain ample and prices reasonable. Rabbits are a good buy particularly in view of their small bones and correspondingly large amount of meat per pound. Good marketing!
