

## American Women Recognized For High-Ranking Federal Jobs

In the first 6 1/2 months of the Eisenhower Administration, women have been signally recognized by Presidential appointments to high policy-making posts. Bertina S. Adkins, Assistant to the Republican National Committee Chairman pointed out today.

Twenty seven newly appointed women are now filling high-ranking Federal positions concerned with diplomatic relations, health, education, social welfare, civil defense, United Nations, foreign as-

sistance, fiscal matters, customs, legal affairs, transportation, patents, employment and parole problems.

"Women worked," Miss Adkins said, "in unprecedented numbers and zeal for the election of President Eisenhower, supporting their leadership to revitalize the national government for the general welfare. The appointment of distinguished women to places of distinction in the Administration is therefore most gratifying to citizens over the country. It is significant that these representative women leaders in politics, national organizations, social welfare work and public administration who have been called to service in vital posts are playing a real role in the daily mounting achievements of the new Administration."

In addition to Presidential appointments, Miss Adkins declared, Cabinet officers and independent Agency heads have named a number of women to important assignments within their own appointive field. More important women appointments are expected shortly, Miss Adkins predicted.

In these first 191 days of the new Administration, women's qualifications for public affairs are already reflected, Miss Adkins said, in the appointment of competent women for several "firsts" including the first woman Ambassador to a major European country, the first career woman diplomat elevated to an Ambassador, the first woman to a newly-established Cabinet post: the first woman deputy Civil Defense Administrator; the

first woman assistant to Director of Mutual Security Administration; the first woman Assistant Commissioner of Patents; the first woman assistant to a Cabinet officer; the first woman member of Advisory Board, Post Office Department.

Fort Area Wood Cutting Resumes

FORT KLAMATH — After having worked for the past three months at the U. S. Indian Forest Service Black Hills unit of timber near Beatty, a crew of eight men (four sets) resumed cutting down trees July 27 for the Modoc Lumber Co., at the Seven Mile division of U. S. forest service timber west of here.

Four day fallers are also on the job, cutting snags on the right of way. Early this spring, before transferring equipment and men to Beatty, two million feet of timber were cut and logs hauled to the company mill at Klamath Falls, and by the time snow flies here, it is expected that the remaining eleven million feet will have been cut and hauled; this completing the logging at Seven Mile unless a forthcoming bid on another stand of timber in the area is successful.

Trucks are still hauling logs from the Black Hills site of woods operations, and will start here about August 10, according to present plans of Donald P. Veatch, logging superintendent of the Modoc Lumber Company. Woods foreman for the company is William DuBois, Chilcoquin.

During the three months of woods operations at the black Hills

unit, seven million feet of timber were logged, and the company will cut a similar amount there for the next eight years, it is reliably reported.
