In The Day's News

The North Korean radio says this morning that 13 North Korean officials have been prosecuted for planning to overthrow the red regime.

They probably got too powerful and aroused the envy of other communists, who TOOK them. That seems to be what happened to Beria, in Russia.

That's communism for you.

This is more shocking: According to freed prisoners, seven Americans and one Briton chose to STAY WITH THE REDS instead of returning to the free way of life. American GI Steve Grawacki of Brooklyn (one of the liberated POWs) reports to the correspondents: "The eight were having a party when we left."

Under the truce terms, prisoners who refuse repatriation are to be turned over to a special commission, and agents from each side will be given the opportunity to try to induce them to return home.

Personally, I'm not in favor of trying very hard to get back any American who wants to stay among the communists. Ours is a free country, where everyone has the right to choose for himself what he wants to do.

Other returned American prisoners tell of MASS BURIALS of up to 2,000 allied prisoners in tense efforts on the part of the communists to convert their captives to the red cause.

Presumably those who were buried (perhaps alive) preferred death to communism.

Let's go back 500 years. John Huss, a Bohemian religious reformer, was condemned and burned at the stake in the year 1415 because he refused to forsake his faith. Martin Luther, a century later, was arraigned before the Diet of Worms for heresy (proclaiming a belief that is contrary to the orthodox belief). It was there that he defended his faith and made his famous statement: "There I take my stand. I can do naught else. So help me God, Amen."

He was more fortunate than Huss. His body was saved from the flames. His writings were re-burned and he was excommunicated and placed under the ban of the Holy Roman Empire. He went on proclaiming his faith.

Ideological differences were grim business four and five centuries ago. They are grim business still.

So much for the past. Let's take a look at the future.

A German rocket expert — Dr. Werner von Braun, chief designer of the German V-2 rocket — says that a permanent SPACE STATION manned by a human crew could begin to circle the earth within 10 to 15 years. Realization of the project, he says, requires only a coordinated space navigation program by the Western powers.

All I can hope is that he is WRONG.

Political ideology: Democratic Senator Herbert Lehman, of New York: "The Republican-controlled 83rd Congress accomplished nothing in the way of civil rights measures."

Republican Senator Irving Ives, of New York: "I am convinced the GOP has a better chance of enacting civil rights measures than the Democrats."

Personally, I am convinced that the civil rights measures that do the most good will be those that originate in the hearts of the people rather than in partisan conflicts in legislative halls.

Let's close on a more hopeful note.

Roseburg Cab Driver Shot

ROSEBURG (AP) — A part-time cab driver was shot and killed here early Friday in a gun fight with a city policeman.

The victim, Loran Kenneth Arthur, 32, Roseburg, was shot through the chest by Patrolman Carl Smith, 27, who was wounded twice. Smith was in a hospital but his condition was not serious.

Smith was called to the lobby of the Grand Hotel at 3:15 a. m. by a hotel clerk who said that Arthur was carrying a gun in a holster on his hip. Smith said he asked Arthur why he was carrying the gun and Arthur replied:

"That's the privilege of every American," Arthur said, added that his wife had been beaten last week on a Roseburg street and he blamed Communists.

Smith then called Arthur outside and placed him under arrest for disorderly conduct. As he reached for Arthur's arm to escort him to jail, Smith said the man pulled his gun and fired. The bullet struck Smith in the leg. The policeman scurried for cover behind a park bench but Arthur shot him again, this time in the back.

Smith, who by this time had drawn his gun, dropped the weapon but managed to recover it and duck behind the car. The policeman said Arthur started around the car after him and Smith fired through the windows. The bullet hit Arthur in the chest and he fell dead.

Smith said Arthur apparently had been drinking. He lived at another Roseburg hotel. His wife left Thursday for Richmond, Calif., to visit a daughter.

Coroner L. L. Powers scheduled an inquest for Friday night.

85% of Women Wayward Enough For Jail: Kinsey

CHICAGO (AP) — Dr. Alfred E. Kinsey, the Indiana University sex researcher, says 85 per cent of American women violate sex laws during their lifetime and would go to jail if they were caught and prosecuted.

Kinsey told a news conference yesterday that only a small fraction of sex offenses are prosecuted because "the laws are so completely at variance with people's actual behavior."

The statement about women was drawn, Kinsey said, from his book, "Sexual Behavior in the Human Female," to be published Sept. 14 as a sequel to his similar volume about men.

Ike Signs Refugee Entry Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower signed into law Friday a bill to admit 100 extra refugees, orphans and other aliens into the United States in the next three years.

He called the legislation a significant humanitarian act and a greater understanding and cooperation among nations of the free world.

The President affixed his signature in the presence of a group of congressional leaders and other persons active in the measure's behalf.

In a statement about the bill Eisenhower said:

"It is a dramatic contrast to the tragic events taking place in Eastern Germany and in other captive nations."

The President went on to say the bill demonstrates again America's additional concern for the homeless, the persecuted and the less fortunate of other lands."

The bill finally sent to the President by a compromise measure containing many provisions aimed at easing out the immigrants, among the immigrants to be admitted are and above regular quota.

Haymes Waits Deportation

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Crooner Ray Haymes today awaits a hearing about two weeks that may mean deportation to his native Argentina.

Immigration officials arrested the 34-year-old singer yesterday on a charge of entering the United States illegally last June.

Haymes posted a \$500 surety bond pending the hearing. He said the arrest was just a technicality and expressed belief it could be straightened out.

The McCarran Immigration Act, adopted last year, provides that an alien who leaves continental United States may not re-enter.

Herman R. Landon, District director of the U. S. Immigration Service, said it would take an act of Congress for the crooner to become a citizen.

Drinking Man Often Sick 3 Dogs on Wife

HOBOKEN, N. J. (AP) — Police said Thursday James Shea, 50, had a habit of sicking his three dogs on his wife every time he got drunk, and they added, that was quite often.

Shea's wife, Maria, who was arrested as a material witness after she refused to press charges, bore scars from over 100 bites, police said.

The charge against Shea said between 1948 and July 31, 1953, "he did sick his dogs on his wife, causing her to be bitten over 100 times."

Shea was released on \$100 bail.

US Fighting Red Chinese Dope Inflow

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal agents have been struggling for more than a year to stem a persistent flow of dope from Communist China to the U. S. West Coast via Hong Kong.

Government officials told reporters of this battle today after the Narcotics Bureau made public its annual report for 1953 on traffic in opium and other dangerous drugs.

The report said simply that the heroin has appeared in the traffic on the West Coast in considerable quantities, and added: "The source of this heroin is Communist China."

B. T. Mitchell, the bureau's enforcement officer, said the heroin traffic by way of Hong Kong, a British crown colony, was first noticed when customs inspectors wondered why anybody would want to import so much heroin.

It turned out the packages were hollowed and filled with vials containing about an ounce of heroin each.

Heroin is one of many drugs made from opium. In its pure state, it is worth about \$1,000 an ounce.

Chinese in Hong Kong, Mitchell said, sent the dope money to other Chinese in their country, most of whom were in the United States. The money was used to buy more heroin.

Use of the mails to ship the narcotics has been sharply cut, but bureau officials said, by other means smuggled from the East.

"This is a debt of conscience (sic)—and concluded: 'You're truly, ananamous' (sic)."

Several 'GI Chinks' Remain Behind to Live Under Reds

FREETOWN, VILLAGE, Korea (AP) — Liberated Americans Friday disclosed for the first time that some American prisoners of war—and at least one Briton—have swapped freedom for life under Communist rule.

An Ohio soldier said three Americans in his group went back even as their truck rumbled toward the Panmunjom exchange site.

Cpl. Charles Bryant, Jr., of Cincinnati, said they apparently wanted to remain with the Reds.

Many South Koreans also were reported to have chosen to remain in the north, some as the result of intense Communist propaganda, others because they believed Chinese warnings they would be "killed" if they returned.

Two U. S. soldiers just from the same North Korean camp said they knew of Americans who had refused repatriation—apparently the relentless Red propaganda.

Four other repatriates said at least three Americans knew

probably will remain behind of their free will.

Cpl. James Davis, Bradshaw, Md., said the three got special treatment.

"If you hit one of them you'd be going down the road—two to five years in prison," Davis told newsmen.

"We called them GI Chinks or Chink Lovers."

Pfc. Donald C. Stewart, 20, of Cincinnati; Pfc. Theophilus Parris of Huntsville, Ala.; and Pfc. Harrison West, 26, of Gary, Ind., concurred with Davis that the three, all Negroes, would not return.

The four were liberated from a Red prison camp at Pyoktong near the Manchurian border.

Another American from the Pyoktong stockade, Pvt. Steve Glowacki, 22, of Brooklyn, N. Y., said the camp was emptied during the first days of the prisoner exchange except for one Briton and seven Americans. He said the eight stayed behind voluntarily.

"They were having a party when we left," Glowacki said. "I didn't associate with them."

Pfc. Thomas R. Murray of Baltimore, Md., who said he knew "about" seven Americans at Pyoktong who turned down repatriation, described them as "the biggest progressives" in camp.

"Progressives" is a term the Allied prisoners tagged on fellow captives who swallowed Communist propaganda.

Under the armistice terms, prisoners—both Allied and Red—who refuse repatriation are to be turned over to a five nation commission, during which time agents from their homelands will have a chance to convince them to return. If they continue to refuse repatriation they will be freed within six months after the armistice was signed.

The Communists, in a Peiping radio broadcast Friday, said they have never screened prisoners to determine whether they want to return home.

The broadcast said the Reds will tell the U. N. command "as soon as possible" the number of captives they hold who refuse repatriation.

Other Americans returned in Friday's exchange added to the mount-

ing evidence of Communist brutality and disregard for human life. They told of mass burials of up to 2,000 Allied prisoners, jail sentences for "instigating against the peace" and intense attempts to convert captives to communism.

Pfc. William H. Davis of Hearn, Texas, said "10 or 12" Americans were being held in Red camps awaiting trial on various charges—most of them "instigating against the peace."

He said one enlisted man at Pyoktong had already been sentenced to a year and was being held back from the prisoner exchange.

Cpl. Ulysses G. Baugh, 22, of Little Rock, Ark., told of a Chinese company commander who "threatened to cut my head off" if he didn't write an article for Communist propaganda.

Baugh said he was branded a "reactionary" because "I told him I could not write them."

"They said I was sabotaging their teaching. They had me stand at attention in the cold."

Baugh, who spent 33 months in Red captivity, said the propaganda continued week after week.

New E. Zone Precautions Being Taken

BERLIN (AP) — Soviet Army tanks today were reported ringing many East German factories to deal with possible outbreaks of the rebellious population.

The report, published in the East German newspaper, Neues Deutschland, said that the Soviet army was on alert for possible outbreaks of the rebellious population.

Neue Zeitung said the Red tanks first called out to quell the June 17 rebellion, had been stationed around "numerous big East German factories." There was a declaration, however, that violence had not occurred at any of these potential trouble spots.

With the crumbling of the Soviet bloc against the food shortage, the East German government has been forced to take drastic measures to deal with the problem.

No Reprisal Probe Likely At This Time

WASHINGTON (AP) — Chairman Short (R-Mo.) said today the House Armed Services Committee has decided against making any immediate investigation of reported Communist atrocities against American prisoners in the Korean War.

It might bring reprisals on Americans still in Red hands, Short said in an interview.

He made the statement as demands were voiced by some other members of Congress for investigation of atrocity stories brought back by the latest Americans to come home from Red prison camps this week.

Rep. Machrowicz (R-Mich.) called for such a probe. He said in a separate interview it should be conducted "just as soon as possible, while the evidence is fresh."

Machrowicz also endorsed a demand, voiced Wednesday by Sen. Potter (R-Mich.), for a Senate Armed Services Committee investigation of evidence that the Reds apparently held back seriously ill prisoners last April, when they were supposed to exchange them.

But Sen. Ferguson (R-Mich.), a member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, expressed doubt that a congressional investigation would be worthwhile.

"It is a terrible and dreadful thing," he said, urging that the Eisenhower administration make "all the facts" known to the world.

Gen. Mark Clark, United Nations Far East Commander, said in a Pentagon news conference yesterday the Reds may have 2,000 or 3,000 more Americans than the 3,313 they have agreed to free.

Latest casualty reports list 8,703 Americans as missing in action, some of whom are believed to have been captured.
