Dodgers Keep Lead

More and more it looks as if the Chicago White Sox are going to need outside help if they hope to overhaul the fast-moving New York Yankees.

The Sox went into today's double-header in New York trailing the world champions by six games. After today the clubs meet only six more times, meaning of course that the most the Chicagoans could possibly make up by their own efforts would be to tie the Yankees. Where the Sox can find that outside help is another question since so far this season they are the only club that has as much as broken even with Casey Stengel's crew.

After yesterday's 6-1 victory by the Yankees, the season's series stands all even at seven games each.

It looked for awhile as if the Sox were going to jump off to a comfortable margin in the second inning of the first contest when with one out they sounded Eddie Lopat for four straight hits, a double and three singles. But the attack netted only one run as a squeeze play failed and the Yankees settled the issue in the very next inning.

Lopat started it with a single. Joe Collins walked and when Minnie Miñoso missed a quick cutoff on Mickey Mantle's liner to left center, the fleet-footed Yankee circled the bases as fast as you can say, "When do they start selling World Series tickets?" The next man up, made the runs look legitimate by poking the ball into the right field seats. Billy Martin homered with one aboard in the eighth.

The Yankees gained another full game over the third-place Cleveland Indians, who bowed to Boston 4-2. Brilliant fielding by Jim Pier-sall and relief pitching by Ellis Kinder saved Mel Parnell's 15th victory. Philadelphia edged Detroit 3-1 in one of the fastest games of the year, 24 hour and 43 minutes.

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — This country's top girl swimmers, who broke records in every event they got a chance at Friday, got a crack at four more Saturday.

The Women's National AAU Out-goes into the second day of the three-day meet with the 110-yard backstroke, the 200-yard breast-stroke, the 400-yard freestyle and diving and the 300-yard freestyle relay on tap.

One of the records they belittled Friday was a world's mark that had stood since 1938 when Reginald Nyberg of Denmark swam the mile in 21:15 minutes at Helsinki.

RECORD — Carolyn Green, a port 19-year-old member of the Ft. Lauderdale, Fla. Swim Association, tirelessly endured 2 lengths of the 400-yard Janzena Beach pool in 2:44 minutes to break that record.

Her wild coach, Tom Lamar, told a thousand spectators from the stands that he was tired just from watching, and turned to the 4-11 Miss Green, a student at the University of Miami.

"Oh, I was tired," the 130-pound brunette chimed, as she accepted her medal, and bounced down from the platform.

There were three other events, and American records set in each.

STUDENT — Judy Roberts, another 19-year-old student, won the 110-yard freestyle in 1:07.9 minutes. That belittled a 2-year-old American record of 1:08.2 minutes, set by Helene Madison of Seattle. Miss Roberts is swimming for the Indianapolis Athletic Club.

Barbara Stark, 18, San Francisco, won the 200-yard backstroke in 2:46.7 minutes, nearly four seconds under the 2:49.6 record which had stood since Elmer Helm Jarrett, New York City, set it in 1936. That is the same Elmer Helm who recently was divorced from showman Billy Rose.

The other mark to fall was in which Gail Peters of the Waller Reed Swim Club, Washington, D. C., won in 4:21.7 minutes. That belittled the American record of 4:27.5 minutes by Evelyn Kawame-ta, Hawaii, in 1948, and the 4:34.9-minute performance of Mary Freeman in a qualifying heat Friday.

Miss Freeman, also of the Waller Reed club, was second.

That is the Waller Reed team far in the lead with 30 points for the day. The Ft. Lauderdale team is next with 18, followed by the Indianapolis A.C. and the Lafayette, Ind., Swim Club with 7 each; Crystal Springs, San Francisco, 6; Mulholland Athletic Club, Portland, and Los Angeles Athletic Club, 5 each; Community Builders, Chicago, 4; Naumau YWCA, Hawaii, and Berkeley, Calif., City Club 1 each.

Wilmer Mizell went all the way for his 10th victory.

The Phillies are 1½ games behind the Dodgers but they play like champions when they encounter the Cubs. Their triumph yesterday was their 13th in 14 meetings. The Phils finished their eighth home run in the ninth and had only one other: runner, Ralph Kiner hit his 27th homer for Chicago.

Vera Wickford, one of the few Braves who didn't show immediate improvement in the move from Boston to Milwaukee, turned in a first-inning hit in his first start on June 24. Dan Cramer hit a two-run homer for the Braves. The victory was Wickford's second of the season.

SEATTLE (AP) — A body blow thrown in the desperation of a losing battle soured up the veteran Harry (Kid) Matthews of Seattle last night and put the fat but agile British heavyweight champion, Don Cockell, on the road to a 10-round split decision victory.

Matthews, 34, who had paid a record \$98,400 to see the scrap, was as surprised as the 180-pound Matthews at the sudden ninth-round explosion. Cockell, who outweighed Matthews by 31½ pounds, was bleeding from a deep gash over his left cheekbone and seemed to have been after eight rounds.

KNOCKDOWNS
Then he caught Matthews with the sweeping smash to the mid-section and blasted the Seattle veteran on the jaw before he hit the canvas in the first of three nine-second knockdowns in that decisive ninth round.

There were howls of rage in the Matthews camp after the decision was announced. Only Judge Eddie Pinkham favored the 31-year-old "Kid." 51 points to 49. Judge Jim Grant had it 50½ to 49½ for Cockell and Referee Jimmy Wilson voted for the Britisher 55 to 43.

"I thought Harry won 7 out of 10 rounds," said Jack Hurley, Matthews' manager. "He was no far in front at the ninth I didn't see how he could lose."

But the fight was decided entirely on points. The Associated Press scored and had Matthews winning six rounds, with two going to Cockell and two even—but split the points, 56 to each man.

COT
Matthews began piling up the points from the start, evading the rushes of the overweight Cockell and punishing him with sharp jabs and hooks. In the sixth he opened a cut on the cheek and a half long on the Londoner's cheek and he kept it bleeding for three rounds.

Twice Dr. James T. Moriarty, Washington Athletic Commission physician, entered the ring between rounds to survey the wound and the crowd half expected him to stop the fight. When he didn't, the fans urged Matthews to make it a kayo finish.

Early in the ninth Cockell landed his pay-off punch as Matthews moved to avoid entrapment in a corner. Burly Don kept launching haymakers at Matthews, kept getting up, and most of them landed. The third knockdown, off a looping left, almost knocked Matthews through the ropes.

The bell ended the massacre and Matthews came back strongly in the tenth.

"I was slow," said Cockell. "I couldn't catch him."

"I weighed 206 when I got here and went up to 211½ before the fight. I didn't get any road work and it slowed me down."

For Matthews, this could mean the end of a long career. He was considered a top title contender until he lost on a second round kayo to Rocky Marciano last year.
