### Tulelake Lodge To Break Ground

TULELAKE — Ground will be broken Sunday for the foundation of the new Canby Cross Masonic Lodge Temple at the corner of Main Street and the East West Road.

The building will be two stories high with floor space of 44 by 80 feet of pumice tile construction. Cost of the building will approximate \$35,000 with much of the labor and some materials to be donated.

The main floor will include an auditorium with a capacity of 300, a kitchen and storage space. The second floor will be used for lodge rooms.

The building, which will be made available for use of other organizations, probably will not be completed until spring.

Canby Cross Lodge has been meeting in the annex of the Tulelake Presbyterian Community Church for several years.

### Fremont Forest Visitors Due

LAKEVIEW — A group of national and regional Forest Service officials will spend two days on the Fremont National Forest Aug. 13 and 14 as part of the general inspection they are making of Region 6.

Heading the party will be Ed Cliff, assistant chief of the Forest Service in charge of the administration of all national forests. Cliff is well known here, having been supervisor of the Fremont from 1942 to 1944.

With him will be Roland Rosty, in charge of reforestation in the branch of state and private forestry, Washington, D.C.; Regional Forester J. Herbert Stone, Portland; Larry Mays, assistant regional forester in charge of operations, who was Fremont supervisor from 1944 to 1946; and Bob Howland, director of the Pacific Northwest Forest and Range Experiment Station, Portland.

On the morning of Aug. 13 the party will be met at Odell Lodge by Supervisor John E. McDonald and Cliff Windle, Fremont staff office in charge of range management. They will enter the Fremont National Forest through Silver Lake Ranger District and will inspect the areas of Antelope Flat, Coffeepot Flat and the Che-waucan, inspect the new Thomas Creek road and the Camp Creek burn and tree and grass plantings.

On Friday, they will inspect the South Warner logging area, Willow Creek burn and reseeded, the Doe Lake logging area and the Doe Lake burn and reseeded.

While here, the party will also look into the operation of the Lakeview Federal Unit and its progress.

### Circus Sets Up Sunday For Courthouse Bids Awarded

The Shrine-Pollack Bros. Circus will arrive Sunday afternoon and start setting up at the Klamath Falls Fairgrounds in preparation of its fifth annual appearance here on behalf of the Klamath Falls Shrine Club, Monday and Tuesday. Afternoon and night performances are to be given both days at 2:15 and 8:15.

A special bus caravan will bring 300 children from Alturas, Calif., to the opening performance Monday, and there also will be groups from Dorris and Tulelake, Calif., and Merrill, Chiloquin, Fairhaven, Malin, Bonanza, Bly, Gilchrist and Chemult.

Many youngsters, who otherwise would not be able to attend the circus, are to be entertained through blocks of tickets donated by business and professional men, industrial concerns, fraternal organizations and civic clubs. Some of these have been given out by the donors themselves and others through such agencies as the Klamath County Public Welfare Commission, City Recreation Commission, Salvation Army and YMCA. Special guests will include children of the Sacred Heart Academy and residents of the county home.

The circus comes direct from a record-breaking four-day engagement in Reno, following 18 stands in California. From here it will go to Kennewick, Wash. and then to Seattle and Vancouver, B.C., before returning to Oregon for several more stands. This shift in route puts the show in Klamath Falls six weeks earlier than in previous years.

Shrine Club and circus officials point out that use of the Fairgrounds as the exhibition site will show off the aerial acts to much better advantage than would be possible in the Klamath Armory. In fact, it is explained, several aerial features of this year's edition would have to be curtailed or eliminated if the circus were appearing in the armory.

Starting Sunday afternoon, riggers and prop hands will complete the installation of the circus in ample time for the opening performance. Know-how and efficiency conquer the complexities of setting up the circus.

Performers check the safety of their own apparatus as riggers fit tons of paraphernalia into place. The scene meanwhile takes on an aura of enchantment from brightly lit costumes that are brought out of big wardrobe cases for the gala production numbers and clown interludes directed by Barrette.

Most difficult to install is the gear for the high-wire daredevil act of Terrific Triskas, the trapeze intrepidity of La Norma, the mid-air precision of the Nine Ward-Bell Flyers, the teeth-suspension gyrations of Barrette's Human Butterflies and the aerial canon of the Aeriovelles.

Offering a study in orderly confusion at ground level are the widely assorted "props" that implement the foot-juggling acrobatics of the Seven Ashluns, the Chinese gymnastics of the Jim Wong Troupe, the trampoline high-jinks of the Schaller Brothers, the tight-rope toe dancing of Lola Dorchich and the four-footed achievements of the trained animal acts.

Convenient to the circus arena are the portable cages of Klausner's Bears and the kennels of Sonny Moore's Roustabouts, a highly varied and versatile group of canine performers. For the movie-trained elephants known as Three Girls from Hollywood, the dancing horses of Albert Ostermaier and the bareback horses of the Alberto Zoppe temporary quarters have been arranged in buildings at the Fairgrounds.

### CHICAGO LIVESTOCK

CHICAGO (AP) — The hog market rose sharply at the end of this week after continued declines had dropped the prices of barrows and gilts to the lowest levels since mid-April. Cattle and sheep were both quoted lower.

The late improvement in the hog market was especially marked on new crop hogs scaling around 210 pounds. The declining markets through most of the period reflected a poor wholesale trade on fresh pork cuts. Bulk barrows and gilts were \$1.25 to \$1.50 lower and sows dropped unevenly 75 cents to \$1.50.

Cattle supplies were a little larger than last week, and with one exception were the greatest for any week since mid-June. Receipts were 15 per cent greater than in the same week a year ago. Corn fed steers and yearlings predominated, but heifers also were in liberal supply.

Steers and yearlings closed unevenly weak to \$1 lower. Top was \$27.50.

Lamb prices dropped \$1 to \$1.50. The decline was a direct reflection of sharply lower dressed prices in Chicago and in the east.
