The bride, given in marriage by her father, wore a gown of white imported Chantilly lace, made with a bouffant floor-length skirt, fitted bodice, long sleeves and a stand-up regal collar. The bride styled her veil of illusion, held in place by a Juliet cap, with a half-wreath of stephanotis.
