President Eisenhower calls this morning for VIGOROUS REDUCTION OF SPENDING by the federal government. He asks all government leaders to attack waste and inefficiency with renewed vigor and to make substantial cuts in EVERY new appropriation.

I was sure you'd do it, sir. When you asked congress last week to go to the bank and arrange a longer line of credit, you were impressed by two important facets of our national fiscal situation:

1. Knowing your history 7a General of the Army must be one of the most SOUNDLY educated men in the world; you were aware that under the system set up for us by the Founding Fathers congress is the keeper of the purse. Since congress had appropriated more money than our existing tax system will produce, you felt, quite properly, that it is the responsibility of congress to arrange for whatever loans at the bank may be necessary to cover the deficit that must ensue.

2. Being an able diplomat (a General of the Army must be a diplomat as well as a soldier) you knew that when the President of the United States and the congress of the United States indulge constantly in disgusting little quarrels and tiffs and spats our country is WEAKENED in the eyes of the world. We've had ample evidence of that fact in the past dozen years or so.

So— Being one of the world's great leaders—

You DEFERRED to congress as the keeper of our national purse and courteously requested congress (as the keeper of the purse) to arrange for the borrowing of enough money to meet the commitments that had been made by congress.

I think you were quite right in doing so.

BUT — The congress, although it had overspent our anticipated national income, chose to disregard your request and refused to go to the bank and arrange for a loan to cover its overdraft.

That left you no choice. As the administrative head of our government, you had to order DRASTIC reduction in spending. That is what your order of this morning calls for.

I think your order is fully justified, and I think the people will understand that under the circumstances there was nothing else for you to do.

Would you mind, sir, a little well-meant advice and back-grounding (briefing) is what you call it in the army) on the fundamentals of political life in America?

You have led a soldier's life. A soldier's life is a clean life and a rather simple one. A soldier sizes up the situation and makes the necessary decisions. If the decisions are wrong, the soldier takes the consequences. If he is of the higher echelons, he takes the TERRIBLE consequences of sending men to death needlessly. If he is of the lower echelons, he dies in the performance of his duty.

In any event, there is no buck-passing.

In political life, it is different. There one of the first and most generally accepted principles is to claim the credit for everything that is good and to PASS THE BUCK for everything that is bad.

That, sir, is what the congress was doing when (after having overspent anticipated income) it refused to make the necessary arrangements for a loan to meet the deficit that had been created by its overspending.

It was passing the buck to you.

Strike Snarls France Again

PARIS (AP)—Rail traffic was snarled throughout France today as a new Communist-ordered transport strike began to creep across the nation. Once more workers fought Premier Joseph Laniel's economy decrees.

Other walkouts threatened and it appeared that France faced a second, gigantic tieup like that last week when two million workers in state and municipal services and government-run industries quit their jobs.

The new tieup was launched by the Communist-led CGT (National Confederation of Labor) which called its 270,000-member railwaymen off their jobs. The non-Communist Socialist Workers' Forces (FO) went along on the walkout.

Most of last week's walkouts were for 24 to 48 hours. This time no limit was set by the CGT.

The FO and the Christian Trade Federation (CFTC) control the rest of the country's 440,000 railway workers. Thus far, there was no indication what the CFTC would do.

The CGT said the aims of the strike were higher salaries and an all-out war on the government decrees, which it described as sitting at the privileges and social benefits of civil servants.

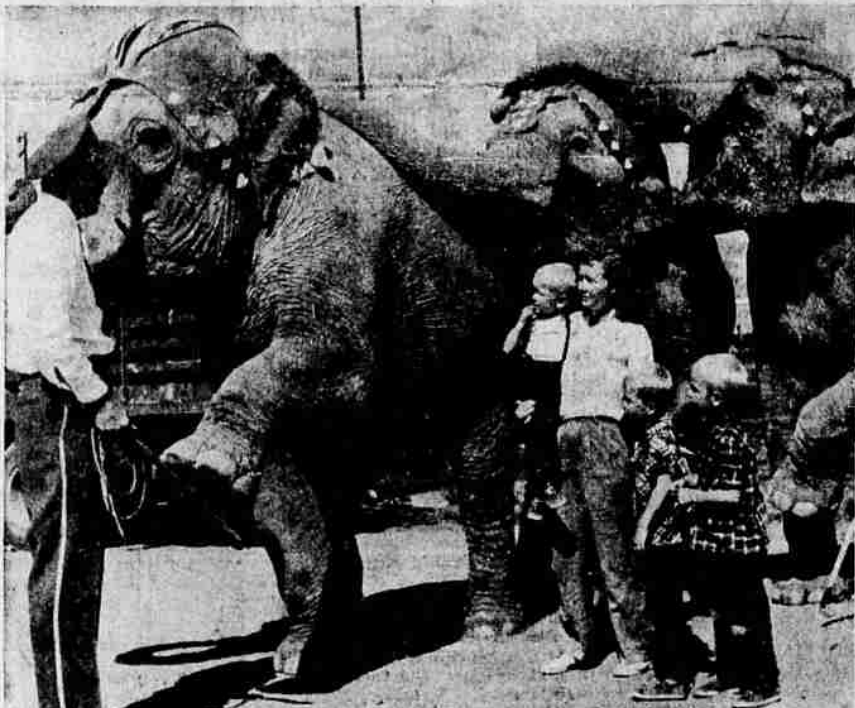

Beer Case Pickets Banned

PORTLAND (AP)—A temporary order banning picketing of a creamery at Lakeview, Ore., was issued in Federal Court here Monday.

Judge James A. Fee ordered the Teamsters Union to halt picketing of the Lakeview Creamery Co. until the National Labor Relations Board has held a hearing on the dispute.

The hearing has been scheduled for Aug. 24 at the Lake County courthouse.

A grand jury recently investigated a disturbance which was an outgrowth of the picketing. A group of Lakeview residents unloaded a truckload of beer after the driver had been turned away from the picket line.

5-Mile Power Line To Ranch

Construction of five miles of power line to the Louis Soukup Herford Ranch at Round Lake will begin within the next two weeks, according to J. Truman Runyan, assistant manager of Oregon California Power Company.

The 12,000-volt line will furnish power for two ranch houses, a machine shop and pumps for irrigation and drainage purposes.

Cost of building the line will be approximately \$18,000 and is expected to be in operation the last of September.

Louis Soukup, former owner of the Klamath Bus Company, purchased Round Lake about three years ago from Jack Gardner, Keith Rice and A. G. Farnsworth and since that time has been developing the lake land into a cattle ranch.

Bay Currents Too Slow For Today's Oysters

ILWACO, Wash. (AP)—Oysters in Willapa Bay aren't reproducing fast enough to suit local growers so they're grinding them by the thousands of bushels.

The meat-grinder treatment mixes sperm and ova and, when the "hash" is strewn on the bay, oyster larvae form in large numbers from the fertilized ova. Full-fledged oysters grow from the larvae.

Under normal conditions, growers have to depend upon currents in the bay to bring sperm and ova together.

Longshoremen Face Ouster

CHICAGO (AP)—The AFL Executive Council Tuesday voted to recommend that the AFL convention next month suspend the International Longshoremen Assn.

The executive council said in a letter to the ILA that the union had failed to carry out the council's demands to rid the ILA of racketeers and hoodlums.

Crime investigators have charged the union with harboring criminal elements.

The ILA has initiated some reforms, but the AFL council concluded they don't go far enough.

The council's suspension recommendation will be acted upon by the AFL convention in St. Louis beginning Sept. 21.

Council recommendations usually win convention approval.
