

State's Rep. Cordon Lauded For Bill-Pushing Know-How

 WASHINGTON (AP) — Traditionally one of the most important Pacific Northwest stories to come out of Congress each year is the appropriation bill for the Department of Interior.

Because it controls the distribution of government-produced power, on which much of the area depends, and governs the reclamation of land on which to produce crops for the region's fast-growing population, the bill probably affects more Northwest residents than any other measure to come before Congress.

Money-wise it closely rivals from a regional standpoint, government expenditures for dam construction made through the Army Engineers.

The Interior bill was even more of a Northwest story this year with Sen. Cordon (R-Ore) heading the appropriations subcommittee which conducted the lengthy hearings involved. Cordon also guided the measure through the

Senate and the give-and-take of conferences in which Senate and House differences were ironed out. The Interior hearings alone were a big job—running morning and afternoon, and sometimes evenings from April 14 through June 3.

The subcommittee, frequently with the Oregon senator the only member in attendance, heard 515 witnesses and amassed 2361 pages of testimony.

At the same time, however, Cordon had the floor managership of the controversial submerged lands bill, was engaged in the Interior Committee's struggles over Hawaii statehood and, according to many observers, was calling the shots for Secretary of Interior McKay during the ex-Oregon governor's "early days in the Cabinet."

Sen. Margaret Chase Smith (R-Me.) recently said, "If there was a bill that I wanted to get the Senate to pass and I felt that the going might get tough, I would want Sen. Guy Cordon to be the floor manager on that bill."

A typical example of Cordon's approach came on a bill to authorize increased appropriations for the Eklutna hydroelectric project near Anchorage, Alaska. He introduced the measure and, when it was referred to the Senate Interior Committee, he promptly stood up and reported it, but with the committee's approval. The House committee kicked the same bill around for months before finally approving it.

Despite his obvious influence, Cordon prefers to remain behind the scenes. Actually, if it can be said of any political figure, it can be said that Cordon shuns publicity. Few public announcements issue from his office. Newsmen use it largely as a fount of background information.

Repatriated GIs AWOL In Korea

INCHON, Korea (AP) — Some repatriated American prisoners have taken unauthorized leave here, officials at the Inchon replacement depot said today. All returned and were not charged with being AWOL.

Military police found one man in a Korean house near the depot. Four became sick and were sent to a hospital to recuperate.

Military police guards said bottles of liquor were passed into the depot at night on strings from outside the wall.

MPs are under orders not to use violence of any kind to prevent a man from leaving the compound but to use persuasion and to call an officer if necessary.

Greeks Quaked 3rd Day In Row

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — Earthquakes shook the islands of western Greece for the third successive day today, causing heavy damage.

One quake early today destroyed all the houses in the village of Samis, on Cephalonia Island. No details of any casualties were given in a message received by the ministry of interior.

Tremors were also felt in Piraeus, one of Greece's largest cities, in the northern Peloponnese, but no damage or casualties were reported.

Another quake reportedly demolished all buildings left in Port Ithaca (population 8,400), on Ithaca Island, early today. Nine people were injured.

Kenan 'Sure' Revolution Will Occur In Soviet Land

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former Ambassador George Kenan said Monday he is sure revolution eventually will "take place in the Soviet orbit."

He cautioned, however, against official United States interference in the internal troubles of the Communists lest this tend to stimulate Red unity.

Kenan, ambassador to Moscow last year and a recognized authority on Russia, gave his views at a seminar, sponsored by Johns Hopkins University, on Soviet imperialism.

He pictured Russia's danger to the outside world as probably on the wane.

Kenan said Soviet ideas no longer have a powerful attraction in the Western world—where the danger, he said, is one of military power. In Asia, he suggested, there has been "a certain turn of the tide of battle" toward the forces of realism and common sense.

"Plainly the doctrine of Soviet power is faced today with severe strains and crisis," Kenan said, adding:

Government For Italy Worked Out

ROME (AP) — Attilio Piccioni was reported today to have worked out a new Italian Cabinet with his predecessor, pro-American Alcide de Gasperi, still in office as foreign minister.

The 61-year-old Piccioni, who rose quietly to the post of De Gasperi's deputy premier, was expected to present his new government to president Luigi Einaudi tomorrow.

That would end, at least temporarily, a two-week government crisis since De Gasperi's eighth postwar government, pledged to the Atlantic Pact and European union, fell to opposition of the rising Fascist-Monarchist right and Communist-Socialist left.

Rome's major newspapers said

Piccioni's Cabinet would be composed of his own and De Gasperi's Christian Democrat party associates, plus two Liberals and one Republican.
