Speaker Martin Lauds GOP in War & Peace; Douglas Would Include Sun Spots as Well

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Douglas (D-Ill.) today labeled as "the most far-fetched thing I've ever heard" Republican claims of credit for prosperity at home and the truce in Korea.

House Speaker Joseph W. Martin Jr. (R-Mass.) made the claims in a nationwide telecast last night.

lauding the record of the new administration and the first session of the Republican-controlled 83rd Congress.

Martin said the Korean War was "the No. 1" problem facing the GOP regime when it took over from the Democrats in January. He declared that it was met by "a refreshing toughness" in foreign affairs which "touched off an amazing chain of events."

The first move, Martin said, was Eisenhower's order to the U. S. 7th Fleet to quit shielding Red China against possible attacks from Chiang Kai-shek's Nationalist forces on Formosa.

Results of the new policy, narrators on the telecast said, included the exchange of wounded prisoners in Korea, the Korean truce, anti-Communist riots in East Germany, desertion by Communist fliers, and the release of William Oatis, Associated Press reporter imprisoned in Communist Czechoslovakia.

Breithaupt Loses Hay in Blaze

Neighbors reported a fire Sunday afternoon at Paul Breithaupt's ranch at Poe Valley during his absence.

He returned to find the OTI fire department and friends had saved his barn and nearly half of the chopped hay stored there.

It was believed that the fire started from internal combustion. Between 200 and 250 tons of hay was lost in the feeder barn.

"Why doesn't Speaker Martin claim the sun spots and the drought?" Douglas commented in a newsman.

"President Truman probably could have had a peace in Korea last summer if he had been willing to take the same prisoner of war terms which we now have accepted."

The Illinois senator said he feared there were weaknesses in the present cease-fire terms which would become obvious soon. One he said, was the privilege granted the North Koreans to build airfields down almost to the 38th parallel.

As for the 7th Fleet order, Douglas said it was no change in policy—that Truman had been permitting the Chinese Nationalists to make hit-and-run raids on the coast without formal sanction.

The senator emphasized that, despite Eisenhower's order, "there has been no invasion of the mainland" by Chiang Kai-shek's forces.

Martin also bore down heavily on the prosperity theme. He said "record after record has been broken" by the American economy in the six months since January.

Douglas' comment was: "Eisenhower inherited prosperity from Truman."

"If Mr. Martin is not careful," the senator added, "he will have to assume responsibility for a recession, when and if one breaks out."

The filmed telecast, shown last night on the ABC-TV network, is scheduled tonight on Du Mont at 9 p.m., EST, and will be available for further showings later on.

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
