City Airport Check Sign Contract Let

The airport will soon have check signs on the taxi ways and landing strips.

Russell Avery, airport manager, showed plans of proposed signs and quoted two bids for the work. The contract was awarded to Klamath Sign Co. for 28 metal signs, \$147.20.

Avery requested authorization to purchase the needed directives and told Council members of a near collision Tuesday morning between a DCU and a smaller aircraft on the runway.

"There is great danger," Avery said, "in getting the planes off without adequate signs."

The second bid on the signs was submitted by Contractor's Equipment in Portland; \$278.45 for reflector lights signs; \$157.50 for plain wooden signs.

Rogers Cut-Off Estimate \$5,242

An estimate on the completion of the proposed Rogers cut-off has been turned over to the city street committee for recommendations. It was learned at last night's meeting of the City Council. The development will run from River-side to Rogers street.

Taxi Thomas, city engineer, estimated the cost at \$5,242, or if the road was made "just passable," about \$3,676. He also reminded Council members that \$5,000 was allowed in the budget for this project.

City Okays Lots For Park Use

The City Council last night approved a request to turn over to the Park Board two lots, 50-by-150 feet, to be used in addition to the two 50-by-50 lots already being developed in the new Henderson Park. The proposed park is located between Main and the U. S. Canal in the Dixon Addition. City's contribution is lots three and four in block five.

California Paving Ordinance Moves

First and second readings of an ordinance authorizing paving of a section of California Avenue was last night approved by the City Council.

The paving project will run from the north line of Upham to the south line of Delta.

Mayor Landry said that five out of eight residents affected had agreed to contribute toward the cost.

City to Contribute To Park Restrooms

The City Council last night voted to contribute \$500 from the Recreation Committee funds toward the proposed restrooms at Fairview Park. Remaining costs will be provided by School District No. 1.

Mayor Paul O. Landry said, Construction is being handled by Vern Schortgen, city building inspector.

Storm Sewer Project Up to Contractor

Councilmen voted to extend a proposed storm sewer project provided contractors agree. Action followed reading of a letter presented by Taxi Thomas city engineer, from Bud Cloake who operates a Chevron Station at 1203 Main.

Cloake argued that construction work at this time would interrupt summer business.

Thomas said he did not believe it would interfere with the contractor's plans since they could instead begin work on the California Avenue paving project.

An additional number of days will be granted to the contractor to comply with the time extension.
