asking now: Will big business go the same way? Will corporations grow so huge that corporate red-tape will strangle them?

The electronics industry thinks it has a solution. It sees business in the years just ahead going over to automatic controls. That means fewer people can turn out more—both at the factory or production level and at the office or control level.

When mechanical brains take over, the electronics men contend, corporations can grow much larger and yet be more easily run than at present.

For example: An oil refinery already runs with very few men needed to operate it. But at the office end, oil company management is a highly complicated thing, and getting on the unwieldy side.

Almost every week electronics offers management new tools: Speedy calculators, closed circuit television, problem solvers to keep top management in quick touch with sales, production, and inventory. Nearly a hundred companies are busy at work on these electronic devices. Some are specialized machines doing particular jobs. This week Soundscribe Corp. of New Haven, Conn., offered a 24-hour magnetic automatic sound recording device, aimed at the aviation and radio industries, but useful

for recording police and fire calls. Others range up to the mammoth scientific marvels of International Business Machines and Remington-Rand, which solve in minutes business or design problems that would take hours or even weeks for men to figure out themselves.

Speed is the essential factor here in solving big business' greatest weakness. The bigger the animal or corporation grows, usually the slower its movements.

### Anti-Trust Suit Involves Union

PORTLAND (AP)—A store chain accused a labor union and seven butchers in Seaside, Ore., Wednesday of violating the federal anti-trust law.

It was believed the first such action against a labor union in Oregon.

Safeway Stores, Inc., accused the butchers and the AFL Meat Cutters of joining in a conspiracy to increase operating costs of Safeway's Seaside store.

The complaint, filed in federal court here, said the conspiracy was to force Safeway to pay triple time for holiday work, double time for Sundays, and time and a half for work after 6 p.m.

The suit says the seven butchers own and operate markets in the Seaside area, and are members of the union.

The store has been picketed since last Friday.

The suit asks treble damages for loss of trade, the damages to mount as long as picketing continues. The suit also asks a halt to picketing and an order forbidding employers from belonging to the union.

Butchers named as defendants were J. A. Weber, Wenzel G. Luthie, Ray D. Cameron, Robert R. Staley, Wayne G. Smith, Vernon Vincent and Carl R. Hertig. Union officials named were Amos Buck, Herman F. Fahlbusch, Edward Wilson, Tony Wallack and Joseph Y. Henderson.

### Old Auto Drops Apart After Cop Pulls Alongside

RALEIGH, N. C. (AP)—An ancient automobile rumbled down the street.

Coroner Wayne Burdge said the boy, Jack Allen Porter, was retrieving arrows shot into bales of hay by Ronnie Cole, 14. Burdge said young Porter, apparently thinking the other boy had fired all the arrows, raised his head up over the hay as the last arrow was in flight.

An inquest is scheduled.
